I desire to congratulate you immediately on the high distinction which has been conferred upon you, which is a just reward for your valor and high military qualities. The entire French army rejoices with me in the promotion of the man who will soon lead to battle and to victory the valiant soldiers of the great American republic."

## PRESIDENT PRAISES FIVE SONS IN ARMY

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Vincent Kelly, a Jersey City yachtsman, whose five sons enlisted in the army and navy, has received the following personal letter from President Wilson:

"My Dear Mr. Kelly: I want to give myself the pleasure of telling you how gratifying and heartening it is to have prominent to my attention such an inspiring example as that set by

your five boys, with all of their tender arms in the service of the government.

"You may well be proud of such a record, and I warmly congratulate you of the fine spirit you and they have exhibited. Cordially and sincerely yours,

"WOODROW WILSON."

The oldest son is 25 years old and the youngest 17. Three of the boys are of draft age, but all volunteered.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The navy department records show that William J. Dunbar, arrested in New York yesterday as a possible spy, was enrolled as an ensign in the naval reserve in the New York district until about two weeks ago, when his name was dropped because department of justice officials found he had made conflicting statements as to his place of birth. He was a native of Hamburg, Germany. Immediately after he had been dropped from the reserve he tried to enlist in the army and was arrested.
