

ELECTRICITY TO PLAY BIG PART AT WAR FRONT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Electricity, which has completely transformed individual life, is being used in the present war on the greatest scale ever dreamed of.

My authority is Professor Louis D. Bliss, head of the famous Bliss Electrical school, outside of Washington, which had the unique distinction of furnishing to Uncle Sam last June the only complete enlisted company in the army reserve.

"To begin with," said Prof. Bliss, "two of the greatest factors in the present war are absolutely dependent upon electrical energy. The airplane is made possible by its electrical ignition. The submarine is made possible by electrical motors."

"But all along the line you find electricity used. For instance, our army is going to be equipped with electrical trench lights, each run by a small storage battery, which will furnish a light about like that of an automobile."

"Searchlights play a big part. They are continually used at night to sweep No Man's Land, between the trenches. They are also, of course, used as heliographs for signal work."

"The field telephone and telegraph and the wireless telegraph in modern warfare are familiar. Electricity used in operating drills for mining operations in the field, and also for the discharge of the mines exploded under the enemy. Big guns are often trained, elevated and fired by electricity."

"What I said of searchlights and big guns applies equally to the navy. But the big wonder of the navy is going to be the American electrically-driven battleships and cruisers. We have already a proof in the American naval collier Jupiter. A steam turbine drives dynamos furnishing electrical current to motors which directly connect up with the ship's propellers. It is probably the most economical and effective method of driving ships."

"The ammunition hoists to the turrets, and the gun turrets themselves are moved by electricity. Orders on shipboard are given by means of electrical signal bells and buttons."

Jackson county is credited with raising 90,000 bushels of wheat this year and Klamath 200,000. Umatilla county leads with 4,000,000 bushels. The total for the state is 12,000,000 bushels. Clatsop county raised the minimum amount, 1,500 bushels.

In common with all its employees, local S. P. workmen will have the advantages of partial payments on purchases of liberty bonds. On request, the railroad company will buy the required amount in behalf of any employee, allowing as much time in payment therefor as may be desired up to two years in extent, holding the bonds as collateral until fully paid for. This inducement has been the means of getting several subscriptions from among members of the railroad colony here.

Judge C. B. Watson always preaches the good road propaganda. In reality he is back of the movement to have the Green Springs mountain road made a highway worthy of the name, notwithstanding the petitions regarding this improvement are supposed to have had their inception in Klamath and Lake counties. The judge's plan is to have the mountain unit of the highway eliminated and a resurvey made on a greatly reduced grade, the location of which he has not only figured out on a paper basis, but can demonstrate its merits to anyone who will visit the route as proposed by him, where at a glance it does not need a civil engineer to note the advantages of the shorter and easier roadway over to Klamath.
