

PREPARING FOR GRAND DRIVE FOR LIBERTY BONDS

Active Workers Wanted for Each District—Small Audience Attends Natatorium Meeting—Oregon's Subscription to Second Liberty Loan Passes Five Million Mark.

PORTLAND, Oct. 17.—Oregon's subscription to the second liberty loan has passed the \$5,000,000 mark. This is about one-third of the required minimum and one-fifth of the maximum requirement.

Preparations for a hard drive in the local campaign to solicit liberty loan bonds subscriptions are being perfected by W. H. Gore, chairman of the campaign committee for this county, and his lieutenants and advisors.

Committees are being enlarged so as to provide active workers in all localities, it being the aim that every man, woman and child shall be informed as to the urgent need of the second liberty loan and the importance of every one who can possibly do so subscribing for one or more bonds. The drive will be on in earnest just as soon as the organization work is completed.

Four-minute speeches are being made nightly in the theaters of the city by well-known citizens urging the public to subscribe for liberty loan bonds. O. C. Boggs has charge of the speakers.

The theater speaking was started last Saturday night. Among the speakers, only one speech being made at each theater at each performance, have been Charles M. Thomas, Fred W. Moars, H. A. Canada, Rev. William Hamilton, Will G. Steel, Porter J. Neff, Dr. J. C. Rollins, O. C. Boggs and Mrs. Charles Schieffelin.

Small Crowd at Nat. The formal public opening of the local liberty loan bond campaign at the Natatorium last night was attended by a small audience, which heard patriotic addresses by State Senator Samuel Garland, W. S. U'Ren and Chairman W. H. Gore.

In his opening remarks, Mr. Gore apologized to the visiting speakers for the small audience and said that it should not be regarded as a criterion of the patriotism of Medford, a city which had sent out several hundred young men into service in response to President Wilson's first call for volunteers.

It was to have been expected, Mr. Gore added, that at least one representative from the family of each volunteer in service would be present at last night's meeting, and it was to be deplored that such was not the case.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Gore made a fervent plea for the relatives of the local soldiers in service to subscribe for liberty loan bonds, as well as all other citizens.

The audience was small, those present were not lacking in enthusiasm and patriotic fervor, and the meeting was well worth while, for all present, inspired by the addresses, will undoubtedly enthusiastically preach the liberty loan gospel and help create interest in the big campaign that is now on to raise Jackson county's allotment.

An inspiring feature of the meeting was the selections sung by the Medford Choral society, George Andrews, director. The society also sang a number of patriotic selections with the audience.

Mix together flour, baking powder and salt; add milk and water, sugar or corn syrup and nutmeats or raisins. Put into greased loaf pan, allow to stand 30 minutes in warm place. Bake in moderate oven 40 to 45 minutes.
