

PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS TO BUY LIBERTY BONDS

Thru Patriotism of John A. Westerlund, Scholars Are Offered Opportunity of Buying Bonds on Easy Terms Without Interest, \$2 on November 15, Balance \$3 Monthly.

Thru the patriotism of John A. Westerlund, Medford school children are offered the opportunity to purchase Liberty bonds on easy payments. Mr. Westerlund will advance the money without interest, pupils to pay \$2 on each \$50 bond on November 15 and every month afterwards for 16 months, \$3. Mr. Westerlund's proposition is as follows:

Dear Mr. Hills:
Believing that lessons of thrift and patriotism should be instilled on every possible occasion into the minds of the children of our community, and regarding the present occasion as one of the most fitting ever presented for such a purpose, I wish to make the following offer, which I beg leave to request you to have read in every schoolroom in the city:

To the pupils of the Medford city schools:

I wish to help every pupil who feels that he wants to "do his bit" to help his country win the war which is now being fought out so bitterly in Europe, and so I am ready to advance the money to pay for fifty \$50 Liberty bonds, which those of you who first apply to me can take up by paying \$2.00 to my bank on each bond, on or before November 15th next, and every month afterwards for sixteen months pay into my bank the sum of \$3.00 on each bond taken up, making \$50.00 in all for each bond, you to receive in the meantime the full amount of interest which our government pays on the bonds, \$2.00 per year on a \$50 bond. Thus at the end of the sixteen months, you will own your bond and have your interest money besides, and will have been a great help to your country.

When you pay the first \$2.00 to the bank on your bond, you will be presented with one of Uncle Sam's Liberty bond buttons to wear, and show your friends that you have bought a Liberty bond.

We must do all that we can to help win the war. Your older brothers and their comrades, who have enlisted in our army and navy, are fighting at the front in defence of our country, and you should help them at home by saving your money and lending it to Uncle Sam, so that he can feed and clothe our soldiers, who are doing their duty so nobly.

Those who wish to take up the bonds can come to see me at the Hotel Holland.

Immediately on closing of school this noon patriotic boys and girls of the high school began calling on Mr. Westerlund, and by 1:30 o'clock 23 of them had subscribed for Liberty bonds and left for the Medford National bank with orders from Mr. Westerlund that they be given Liberty loan buttons.

TAMMANY USING SCHOOLS IN POLITICS

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—With the opening of the schools this morning the strike spread and disturbances were resumed. At one of the largest Bronx buildings the children broke many windows. They paraded thru the streets with placards reading: "We won't go back to school until the Gary system is taken out." The police dispersed them.

In Brooklyn several hundred women armed with stones forced their way into a school at Brownsville, a Jewish section, and demanded that their children be allowed to go home. Some windows were smashed and several persons were injured, including three policemen, while police reserves were quelling the riot. The 3000 children were dismissed for the day.
