# GERMAN FLEET TOO STRONG FOR DEFENSE FORCES

## Russian Baltic Fleet Could Not Face Germans in Gulf of Riga Without Jeopardizing Gulf of Finland—Story of Battle Shows Germans Outclassed Russians in Equipment.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 20.—The Russian Baltic fleet in its entirety could not face the Germans in the Gulf of Riga without abandoning the responsibility for the defense of the Gulf of Finland, according to Count Kapnist of the Russian admiralty.

"The Germans," he said, "effected landing operations on Oesel island with twelve transports, escorted by twelve battleships, all types, five cruisers, an enormous fleet of auxiliaries and thirty destroyers. It was impossible for our entire Baltic fleet to meet the enemy without abandoning responsibility for the protection of the Gulf of Finland."

The count cited the battle of Jutland as a precedent for the impossibility of using submarines to advantage.

### Story of Battle.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 20.—The Russian ministry of marine has issued the following detailed statement regarding the naval battle in the Gulf of Riga:

"Tuesday night an enemy squadron of twenty ships penetrated the Gulf of Riga and at 9 o'clock the next morning was discovered making its way thru the channels south of Moon sound. The squadron included two battleships of the Koenig type. Our detachments, under Admiral Bakhtreff, who hoisted his flag on the cruiser Bayan, and accompanied by the battleships Grjdanin and Slava, steamed from the eastern part of Moon island to engage the enemy, preceded by torpedo boat patrols, which withdrew before the enemy.

### Vessels Outclassed.

"At 9:30 the enemy opened fire on our torpedo boats and our detachment, issuing from the channel, took

up formation in a radius between the Werden and Weiland lighthouses, near Moon island. While approaching the enemy the cruiser Bayan was attacked unsuccessfully by a hostile submarine.

"At 10:30 o'clock our detachments engaged the enemy squadron. The fire of the hostile dreadnaughts was directed from beyond the range of our old type vessels. At noon, in view of the enemy's superiority and the appearance of new enemy warships, Admiral Bakhtreff ordered the detachment to retire into the interior of Moon sound. Our ships then turned northward and withdrew from the battleship Slava, the last of the line, and which had been damaged severely under the water line, finally sank by the head and foundered in the deep entrance of Moon sound. The remainder of the squadron entered this channel. Part of the enemy squadron began to fire on the Moon and Werder batteries and silenced and destroyed them. Our vessels suffered some damage. After shelling the batteries, the enemy en-

tered the southern part of the Zui-wast roadstead.

### German Losses.

"During these movements the cruiser Admiral Makaroff and some gunboats and destroyers in inner Moon sound protected that channel and the mouth of Kassar bay, between the islands of Dago, Oesel and Moon. Some of these ships remained throughout the night near the coast of Oesel island and repeatedly attempted to make their way into the eastern portion of Kassar bay."

The rest of the statement is a repetition of the official statement, in which it was announced that two trawlers had been sunk by the Russian fire and that two enemy torpedo boats had been sunk by striking mines in the Moon sound region on Thursday. It adds, however, that a German torpedo boat escorting the main squadron ran into a Russian mine and sank.

Two big new forest fires have broken out in the county just as the several big ones up in the forest reserve in the Elk creek country had been conquered, and from fifty to one hundred fire fighters had returned to their homes.

Saturday morning Forest Supervisor Erickson phoned to his office in this city for Assistant Supervisor Foster to rush him ten picked fire fighters at once to a fire that was raging in the Trail district at the head of Flat creek.

About the same time District State Supervising Fire Warden W. T. Grieve phoned in to the city and asked that ten fire fighters be hurried to him on Aleo creek, in the Elk creek country, where a big fire was burning in Jackson County Patrol association territory.
