MORGENTHAU'S REVELATIONS

EVER since the kaiser and his cohorts brought the present world war upon civilization all his agencies of publicity everywhere in the world have made eager efforts to prove Germany was merely fighting a defensive war, forced upon her.

Link by link, however, the evidence is being established which proves beyond peradventure a doubt that this war was one of loot and conquest forced upon the world by Wilhelm Hohenzollern and the aged emperor of Austria, who at that time sat on the throne.

Our former minister to Turkey, Henry Morgenthau, has just revealed the gist of two extraordinary conversations which clearly establish the Teuton blood guilt.

In other words, many weeks before the assassinations at Sarajevo, Austria was making ready for war, being inspired with a desire to dominate the Balkans, to crush the Serbs and to prevent the danger of a Jugo-Slav kingdom.

This is confirmatory of the statement made in the German reichstag recently by a socialist member to the effect that war had been decided upon at a conference held in Berlin, July 5, 1914, when the murder of a royal sprig was eagerly seized as an excuse for carrying out the German plans for world conquest and the Austrian plans for dominance in the Balkans.

Every act, every move, every speech which sought to place Germany in the attitude of the unwilling party to a war was part of a gigantic plot to crash down upon the French and the Russians before they had any suspicion of what was up.

TWO MILLION BOND SOLDIERS WORK IN NATION

Final Week of Great Liberty Loan Drive Begun With Over Three Billions to Be Raised—More Than Half a Billion a Day Needed—Gompers Appeals to Workingmen.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The final week of the Liberty loan campaign began today with workers throughout the country redoubling their efforts to attain the \$5,000,000,000 maximum.

To reach this figure, about \$2,350,000,000 will have to be raised between today and the close of business on Saturday night.

The campaign will probably reach its climax on Wednesday, proclaimed Liberty day by President Wilson, when nation-wide celebrations will be held, with speakers, including many of the country's leading public men.

Two million men, women and children were working today throughout the nation, the treasury department announced, in a great endeavor to bring the Liberty loan to a close next Saturday night with \$5,000,000,000 in subscriptions.

Officials were counting on great results from the appeal to workingmen, made by President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor.
