Liberty bond subscriptions footed up over \$200,000 in the Ashland district at the close of the campaign on Saturday. Among recent heavy subscribers were W. C. and Verna Saunders in the sum of \$5,000, also Judd Miller, Southern Pacific engineer, who took \$1,000 more. When returns are all in, Ashland's record will just about double the original quota of \$103,200.
