

ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Homer Billings, representing local alumni of the State University, will attend a social reunion of the old grads of that institution who will dine sumptuously in reminiscent mood at Hotel Medford, May 10.

Another drive is on this week, representing active and persistent effort in behalf of the normal school divisions here. Moral and financial assistance is being invoked by a band of canvassers who are on the job with a fixed purpose.

Mrs. Lovina Carpenter died Tuesday, aged 79 years. She was a native of New York state, and a resident of this city for nearly a decade. She leaves a husband, W. W. The government is redeeming the Spanish war bonds which were refunded in 1908 for a ten year period on the basis of three per cent interest payable quarterly. The limit of the interest payments on this series will expire August 1, 1918.

The Red Cross chapter here is planning to make Ashland a transfer station in the interstate transportation emergencies, with ambulance service installed from trains to hospital. A canteen for invalid service will also be established on the depot grounds, supplementary with other conveniences in behalf of the soldier boys already existing there.

The Tenop club met this week with Mrs. W. H. Hodgkinson on Church street, six neighboring ladies assisting the hostess in the ideal afternoon's entertainment on Tuesday. Over their cups the ladies in social reunion planned furthering many activities in which they have ever extended a helping hand.

The local Modera Woodman camp has four members in the army, including Charley Rugg, at Mare Island, Cal.; Joe Irenhower, in France with the 88th Aero Squadron; Charley Moore, Fort Stevens, and F. C. Crosslin, at one of the northern encampments.

A final report of the Ashland districts showing as a result of the initial Red Cross drive, has been made, inasmuch as the pledges have virtually all been redeemed. Including this city, Talent and Plonix, the subscriptions were \$10,828.91, of which \$10,621.42 has been collected, being nearly 92 per cent of the amounts pledged. This status is in accordance with the findings of E. V. Carter, district chairman, and the showing made will set the pace for the second big drive to be started this month, calling for \$100,000,000 throughout the nation.

Roy Swigart, manager of the big grain ranch near Montague, owned by the Lamkin Bros. of this city, was the town first of the week, accompanied by his family and other visitors.
