HOOVER ORDERS CUT IN FLOUR SUBSTITUTES

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Wheat flour substitutes should sell from 10 to 20 per cent less than wheat flour, Food Administrator Hoover notified state food administrators today.

Corn meal and oatmeal should sell 20 per cent below the price of wheat flour and corn flour and barley flour should sell 10 per cent below wheat flour, the administrators were informed.
