

BOYS AT THE FRONT SERVING UNCLE SAM

The following letter was received May 4th by Mrs. J. H. Cochran from her son, Harold, who is in the submarine chaser service and is now stationed at Brooklyn, N. Y., preparing for sea duty.

Sunday, 28th.

Dear Old Honey: I have been so busy lately that I haven't written a letter this last week. Have been getting things in shape and working in the engine room. That is some classy room-painted in white and has four shining engines in it. The job is dirtier than the d—but I like the work, and am striving to be an A-1 machinist. We are getting new equipment on board and it won't be long until we are under way. I am anxious to see real service. When I have actually been in service a year or more or maybe less, I'll try for a furlough and come home and tell you all about the sea-sickness and everything. That western front does not look very good at present but I think General Foch has something up his sleeve in the shape of a surprise for the Germans. And it surely is about time to pull it, but he ought to know the best time. I feel better than I have for a long time. I am ten pounds lighter than when I came into the navy, but I was too heavy then. The chow here is the best I've had since I have been eating at Uncle Sam's table. We had ice cream twice today. Have pie two or three times a week and a lot of good stuff.

On the streets, in the above and everywhere in New York a tremendous drive is being made for the third Liberty loan. War talk is prevalent everywhere. I like to see the people all interested because the sooner everyone realizes there is a war the sooner it will be over. Everybody ought to do his share. I am going to buy a \$100 bond myself and on top of that sink every submarine that I come across. I think I'll go ashore tomorrow night and see the Chinese musical comedy Chu Chin Chow. I am going with a friend of mine by the name of Everett Rea from Iowa. He is on SC61 and one of the finest and cleanest fellows I have met since I got in the navy. He has had three years in college and is mighty bright.

Well, honey, I will knock off now, and will try to write to you more often. Am well satisfied and wish you could see our layout. It's great. Love to all. SONNY.

The latest news from Merritt Merriman is that he is doing nicely. The inserted tube has been removed and the wound is healing nicely. He sits up in a chair and reads the papers and magazines and even walks a little. Another month may see him strong enough to leave for home. In the meanwhile if anyone wants to cheer him by sending clippings and cartoons his address is Corporal M. D. Merriman, Post Hospital, Isolation Ward, Barracks 17, Field 2, Hempstead, N. Y. Clatous McCredie is still with him. Clatous is going to have it all over and be done with it. First it was scarlet fever, then diphtheria, and last tonsillitis. He is getting along very well and entertaining Merritt Merriman.

This letter has the postmark U. S. army service.

England.

Letter one. My Dearest Mother: I will try and write you a few lines but I know it will not be very interesting as we cannot say as much as we would like to.

First of all I must tell you that I am all O. K. and hope this letter finds you and grandmother the same. Mother, when you send me candy or any eats be sure and put it in a tin box as it will be more sure to get here and not cause any trouble on the way. I have seen many places which I have often spoken about but cannot tell any names so you can guess for yourself. My trip at sea was very pleasant all the way and fine weather. The Oregon boys sure do have some good luck when it comes to getting fine things.

Mother, I can number all my letters and you can do the same, please. Gee, it sure is hard for me to write when I can't say what I want to. Everything that comes to my mind is just what I have to leave out. I haven't seen Major Kelly yet nor any of the boys from home but hope to soon. Has Feathers-Paul Leonard or Carl (Ringer?) written you lately? Well, mother, as we can write on only one side of the paper and only two sheets to a letter, will close now. As ever, Love, ARTEMUS. Dear Father and Mother: I am well and getting along fine. Hope you are the same. We sure had a fine trip. Got to see a lot. We are in France now. Everything is different here. The houses are built of brick or stone. The passenger trains have side doors with seats for eight in each part and freight cars would hold about 1-3 as much as an ordinary car. All the farms here are small sections but they sure work every foot of ground. Will close. Write soon.

Somewhere in France, April 14th, 1918.

Dear Father and Mother: Well, I am still on the move—there seems to be no top for some time. Have traveled probably 10,000 miles since leaving home without stopping over a week in one place. Our stay in England was limited to one week. Stopped in one camp in France for a couple of days. The next one about the same time. Our present quarters seem to have been used by Napoleon in his prime. As for the present, well, I can't say very much about it. We are located in Central France. Have been able to get out of camp several times. The people here treat us pretty fine. I about the French women—well, I haven't seen one that came up to the American variety.

When I get home again I'm just going to sit and sleep for about a month and it will take something worse than a shotgun to drive me away. There is one thing that is pretty scarce here—or maybe two—viz., candy and tobacco, I have plenty of tobacco, but some chocolate would taste mighty fine. Even the cooking kind. If you send any be sure and pack it in a strong box. We are feeding good and we are well taken care of. There is no cause for worry from that source. As for the war, I wish you would send me some news. Things are pretty dead here. We receive little news of the battles.

George Gates and I were promoted to sergeants. He is going to some tractor school in a couple of days. Do not know what the rest of us will do as yet—may be sent to some school for instruction. Saw Boyd Kahler in England. That's all of the Medford bunch I've seen so far. Now I'm feeling fine so don't worry. Tell the bunch to drop me a line now and then. Will write when possible. Somewhere in France, Apr. 14, 1918. Dear Mother and All: I expect you think I am awfully lazy about writing oftener but I can't write much when writing on account of censorship. Don't get the idea that I am in need of anything because I am not. I have all the clothes I need and all I want to eat and can buy most anything I want. It is raining today; has been stormy for the last couple of weeks except a few days. Day before yesterday was a fine day. We haven't been wet much at any time and if we do get a little wet we can dry our clothes in the tent. We have stoves in all of the tents. Some of the men kick a little but they forget that we are at war and a long way from home. I have put up with more hardships at times at home than I have since I came into the army or to France. I received one bunch of Medford papers a week or so ago and eight or ten letters since I came over here. Will try and write a few lines oftener. Am well at all times. The never was sick only a little sea-sickness about going to town this afternoon but don't think I will if it keeps raining like it is now. I will quit writing now for this time.

S.—Tell dad that I will expect him and Walter to have the mill and everything in good running order by next spring because the war will probably be over by then and I will want to get back to making some more lumber and boxes; if boxes are worth what they were last fall they ought to make some money this summer.
