ITALIANS REPULSE AUSTRIAN ATTACKS IN MONTE CARNO

ITALIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS IN NORTHERN ITALY, May 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—Italian troops repulsed with heavy loss a desperate enemy attempt last night to recapture the loss of Monte Carno. It is believed that this is only the first of a series of efforts to regain the lost ground owing to the value of the height, which commands the approaches to the valley leading from Trent to Rovereto.

The fight last night was in the darkness and was a bloody hand-to-hand struggle over the rocky slopes of the mountains. The Italian positions, however, were maintained intact.

Thus far the fighting around Monte Carno has been of the local character, although outposts show increased activity.

RIGHT IN REFUSING TO BE HANDCUFFED

B. G. Worthington's refusal to permit special deputy sheriffs to place handcuffs on him in the Siskiyou last Saturday night, after they had stopped him to search his automobile, was vindicated Tuesday in Justice of the Peace Gowdy's court at Ashland, when the case against Worthington on the charge of resisting an officer was called for trial.

County Prosecutor Roberts at once requested that the case be dismissed on the ground that after having made a thorough investigation he was of the opinion that there was no case against Mr. Worthington. The warrant for arrest was sworn out against Justice Gowdy's advice, by Jason Hartman, the deputy sheriff who tried to snap the handcuffs on Worthington's wrists.

MOSCOW, May 14.—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press.)—The commander-in-chief of the German troops in the east, replying to the Russian request for the cessation of hostilities on the Ukrainian front, says that German troops, in accordance with the terms of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, have cleared the Ukraine of Red Guards and that it should be possible to do so everywhere along the Ukrainian land frontier.

The commander said he could only agree to the cessation of naval operations against the Black sea fleet provided all the ships returned to Sebastopol and were retained there. Then the port of Novorossiysk would be opened free to navigation. He claimed that the Black sea fleet more than once had participated in the fighting against German troops in the Ukraine.

OGDEN, Utah, May 14.—A special train of 14 steel cars loaded with silver bullion, estimated in value at over \$20,000,000, passed thru here today en route to the Pacific coast. Railroad officials stated the silver is consigned to San Francisco for shipment to the orient, where it will be used to pay over government obligations. Silver is to be used instead of gold, in line with the government policy not to permit gold to be shipped out of the United States.

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WOMAN LAND ARMY TO CAMP AT HOLLOWAY ORCHARD

An agricultural camp for girls will be organized on the holloway orchard, beginning work the first of June. The purpose is to make this camp a self-supporting unit of the women's land army. The girls will have training and actual experience in farm work, orchard work, box making, etc., from the first day they go into camp.

The purpose is to use the camp as a headquarters from which girls may go out to any of the surrounding orchards in need of work and get employment. Enrollments for this camp will be taken at any time in Mr. Cate's office in the Garnett-Corey building; the office of the Fruit association, or by officers of the Girls' honor guard. Also all those girls and women who are willing to work in the orchards this summer, but who expect to go out only for the day and return in the evening are asked to give their names so that the work may be better organized. All enrollments should be in by the last week in May or the first week in June. The organization seeks to give the workers equitable condition and as good a wage as possible and uniform hours.

The idea of the women's land army units has been worked out very thoroughly and effectively in England, Canada and some parts of our own country. The agricultural need is so great at this time that every woman and girl who possibly can should undertake this work. The best of success is hoped for the unit starting here this summer and those interested in the camp are hoping that it will be a start toward a much bigger undertaking next year. The question of labor will undoubtedly be even more serious as the war progresses and more men are taken from the farms and ranches. Women will undoubtedly feel more urgently the call to this form of work and will do their part in carrying it on in every section of America as they have been doing in our allied countries.

LONDON, May 14.—The admiralty announces that during the period May 6-12 inclusive, air force contingents working from Dunkirk carried out successful bombing operations against the Ostend docks and seaplane base, the Zebrugge mole and lock gates and enemy shipping in the vicinity.

"Several direct hits were observed on the sheds on Zebrugge mole and a large shed at the seaplane base was burned up," the statement continues.

"In the course of the offensive patrols, six enemy machines were destroyed and two others were driven down out of control. One of ours is missing.

"On May 10 one of our seaplanes in the North sea sighted a Zeppelin on patrol and an indecisive action, lasting half an hour, was terminated by the Zeppelin retreating to its base."

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PUBLISHER BENNETT DEAD

of the New York Herald and again took a unique position, as this is still the only American daily newspaper published in Europe. During this residence abroad, broken only by the unexpected arrival of the Bennett yacht in New York harbor once every two or three years for a short stop, the editors in immediate control of the New York Herald kept a chair at the conference table always vacant for the absent editor, one of his own ideas to keep his men imbued with the spirit that he was "boss," although several thousand miles away.

The Herald, marked minutely with the names of the men who had written certain articles or news stories, was forwarded to him in Paris daily. He kept in touch with every detail of personnel and policy. Daily or oftener, the cable from Paris, or wherever he might be sojourning in his yacht, brought the editor-in-chief's executive orders, for promotion or discharge, for compliment or reprimand, or sketch of general policies.

Whims and Eccentricities.

His whims, and eccentricities, his critics said, to eccentricities, were one of the most interesting angles of his personality. It is related that he dismissed a musical critic simply because "he was such a funny looking man," and put the financial editor in his place; and that a "copy" boy who ran into the pit of Mr. Bennett's stomach in the Herald office received several dollars' reward for his unusual haste. These and many instances like them were traditions of Herald employees.

He laughed at conventions, and invariably printed in the Herald the worst things his enemies said about him. When Jay Gould gave to the

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press a letter of 10,000 words attacking Bennett's personal life; the editor of the Herald turned about and published it in full with the curt remark that Mr. Gould was "a gentleman." When John Kelley, leader of Tammany hall, publicly assailed Mr. Bennett's character, he retorted: "The proprietor of the Herald lost his reputation long before Mr. Kelley was ever heard of." He swung his newspaper from one side to another in public questions with startling abruptness.

He was assailed for many years for the "personal" advertisements which were once an unrestrained feature of his paper. In 1907 he bowed to the law with payment of a fine of \$25,000, when the court characterized the Herald personals as "a public stenographer."

In his innumerable promotions, all bearing upon the promotion of his newspaper, Mr. Bennett figured as a notable patron of sport. He introduced polo into America; revived coaching in France; organized international automobile and aeronautical races, and built and sailed numerous yachts.
