Franchise bill is passed by district.

AMSTERDAM, May 15.—The franchise bill as amended eliminating the provision for one vote for each man, was passed on third reading in the Prussian diet. The Poles, social democrats and progressives voted against it. The house adjourned until June 4.

PARIS, May 15.—M. Duval, who was director of the suppressed Germanophile newspaper Bonnet Rouge, was condemned to death today by court-martial for treason.

The six other defendants were sentenced to imprisonment for terms ranging from two to six years.

NORTH SEA CLOSED BY BRITISH NAVY

LONDON, May 15.—The British admiralty restrictions on navigation in the northern part of the North sea, caused by the laying of great mine fields for the purpose of foiling submarines, became imperative today, and hereafter all shipping in that area must comply with stringent rules or ignore them at their own peril.

1917. Benham represented himself as one Perkins, who was seeking to buy rifles for Mexicans. According to the witness, Stanton offered to assist him in getting the arms to Mexico with the aid of one "Dynamite Johnny" O'Brien, whose ship, Stanton said, was then in New York harbor. Stanton did not care which faction in Mexico would get the arms, according to Benham.

Stanton described the goods, according to Benham, as 10,000 Winchester, 10,000 carbines, 200,000 Mausers and 870,000 cartridges. The deal fell through, Benham said, because Stanton wanted cash deposited in the bank.

HOME GUARDS TO BE MUSTERED IN AS STATE MILITIA

Medford's home guard company, comprising 100 citizens, will be mustered into the state militia service tonight by Adjutant General J. M. Williams. Early in the evening General Williams will muster in the Ashland home guard company of 75 members, and then will rush to this city by auto to muster in the local body. He will arrive about 9 p. m.

Adjutant General Williams passed through the city this morning en route to Ashland from Portland, and during the train stop consulted with Captain H. A. Canady and decided on the above arrangements.

The Medford and Ashland units, General Williams said this morning will be organized into a battalion. Grants Pass is also organizing a home guard organization, and when it is mustered in it will also be added to the battalion.

Immediately after the Medford unit is mustered in tonight the company will hold an election for permanent officers. The county court recently made an appropriation to purchase uniforms for the Medford and Ashland companies.

The program was made up of folk dances, drills, choruses and the like. Miss Hunter presided back of the stage with a number of assistants and Miss French conducted the high school orchestra and had charge of the musical features. The fine work of the orchestra added much to the pleasure of the occasion.

A number of school principals and teachers assisted in handling the hundreds of pupils and in seeing that the program was run off with clock-like precision. To avoid a congestion in the wings and rear of the stage the children while waiting their turns were stationed at the high school, and each group was sent for as fast as it was needed on the stage. Messengers ran back and forth between the high school and stage, giving these orders. Misses French and Hunter devised this system, which was based on their experience with last year's similar exhibition at the Page.

Objects to war probe. Chamberlain resolution was subject to the view that it might be used in authorizing a "general conduct of the war" investigation. Others contended its terms limited the military committee solely to army affairs.

Senator Chamberlain and others of the military committee have declared there was no objection to limiting the scope of the resolution and have disclaimed any intention of planning any general inquiry into "the conduct of the war."

President's Letter. "I deem it my duty to say," the president's letter said, "that I should regard the passage of this resolution as a direct vote of want of confidence in the administration. The purpose which it undoubtedly expresses has been expressed again and again in various forms during the present session and has always seemed to originate in a rooted distrust of those who are in charge of the executive functions of the government."

Executive Functions. "The executive functions are very clearly understood. They have been defined both by the constitution and by long experience, and no one can doubt where the responsibility for them lays or what the methods are by which those who are responsible can be held for their duty."

Such activities on the part of a particular committee of the senate as this resolution would look forward to would constitute nothing less than an attempt to take over the conduct of the war, or at least, so superintend and direct and participate in the executive conduct of it as to interfere in the most serious way with the action of the constituted executive. I protest most earnestly against the adoption of any such action and shall hope that every senator who intends to support the present administration in the conduct of the war, will vote against it. These are serious times and it is absolutely necessary that the lines should be clearly drawn between friends and opponents."

Form Purely Formal. In consideration of the Chamberlain resolution, the expenditures committee called Senator Chamberlain before it and at a spirited session the Oregon senator disclaimed that the military committee, under the resolution, ever had any intention of holding any general inquiry into the "conduct of the war." With much show of feeling, Senator Chamberlain told the committee that its "whole and only" purpose was formal and in accordance with customary routine and also to give the committee "somewhat more power" than it had for past investigations.

Senator Chamberlain said he was ready to "take the whole question to the floor of the senate" and make his "record" there.

Senator Chamberlain indicated that if the senate were to refuse to pass an amended resolution giving the

How to Brush Teeth

Most tooth-brushing is done very thoughtlessly. It does not remove food deposits from all the surfaces of the teeth and the mouth.

The tooth-brush must not be too coarse and stiff, and it should not be drawn straight across the teeth. The proper method is to brush from the gums towards the cutting edge of the teeth with a slight circular motion.

Avoid the use of coarse or gritty tooth-powders and all tooth-pastes containing soap, and all tooth washes purporting to cure or prevent dental trouble. After each brushing, the mouth should be rinsed out with lukewarm water. The tooth-brush should be cleaned and kept dry when not in use.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS TO GUARD RESERVOIR
