

OREGON CALLED UPON FOR 1500 MEN FOR ARMY

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Twenty four states and the District of Columbia were called upon today by Provost Marshal-General Crowder to furnish for the national army 51,600 more men, qualified for general military service.

Movement of drafted men to the camps under this call is to extend over two periods—from May 20 to 24 and from May 29 to June 2. These dates were fixed because during the five days beginning May 25, approximately 233,000 men called for recently will be moving to the camps.

Expect Troop Replacement

Today's call marks further development of the government's plans for hastening men to France and replacing them as rapidly as they vacate the training centers. In all, 284,600 drafters will be journeying from their homes to military camps between May 20 and June 2. Including numerous calls for technical and specially qualified men, the total number summoned during May, is something like 366,600, nearly half of the 800,000 expected to be called this year.

While officials did not explain why only half the states were asked to furnish men at this time, it is understood that the sections to be drawn upon were arrived at thru consideration of the proportion of quotas already called in some cases and of the location of vacated training camps.

Wide Distribution

The camps selected for the registrants affected by tonight's order are not all national army camps, showing that men are to be sent wherever room may be found for them. In several instances men from certain states are ordered to go to camps to which men from their states are not usually assigned. The western states drawn upon and camps assigned them are as follows:

California, 1500 to Fort McDowell, Cal.

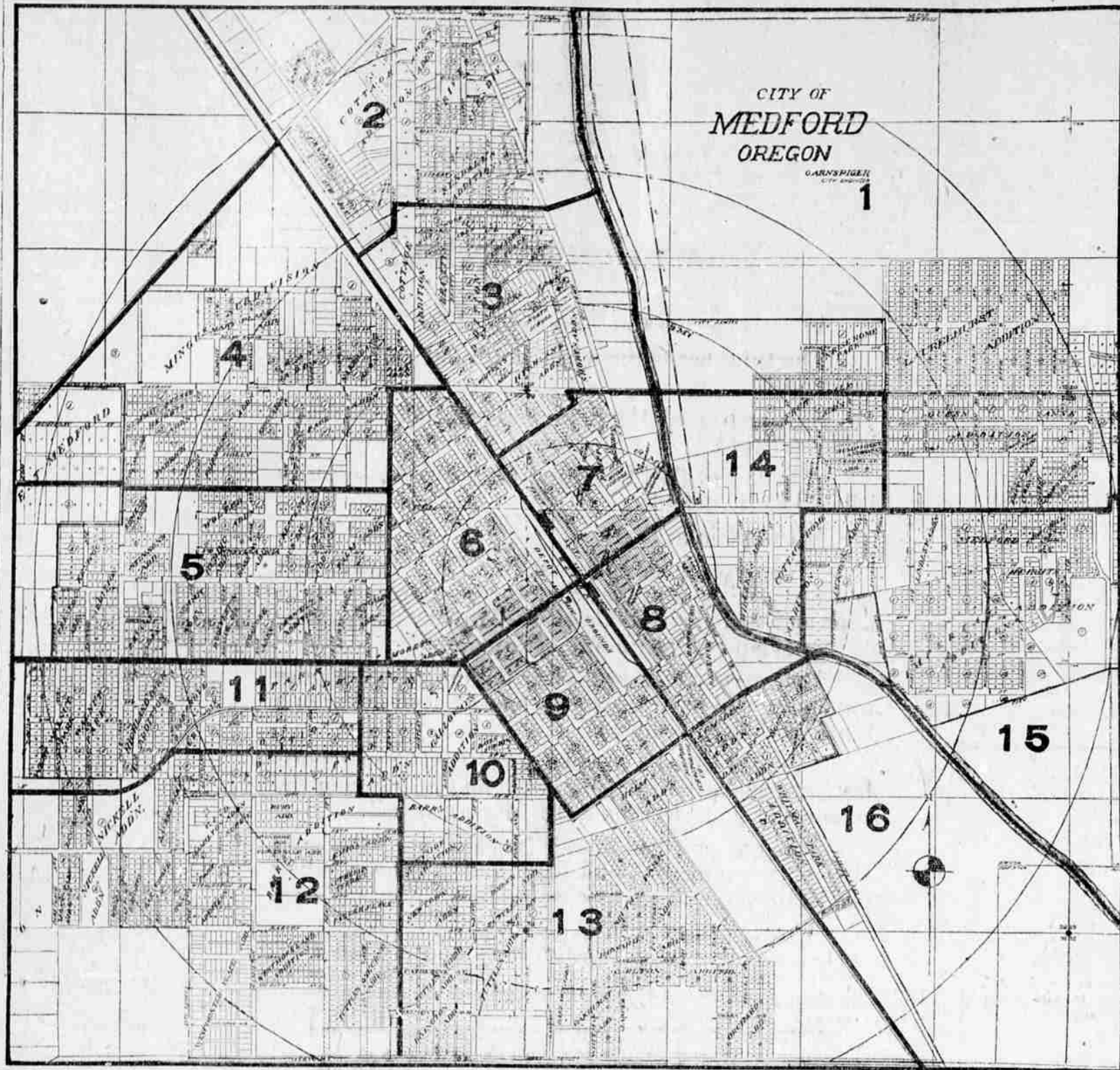

LIBERTY MOTORS SENT TO HELP OUT ALLIED FORCES

WASHINGTON, May 15.—American-built liberty motors may first reach the fighting lines in France driven by French and British scouts. It was learned tonight that urgent requests from the allied governments for early delivery of the American engines have been received and are being met. Shipments already have been made to Great Britain and there are intimations that General Pershing approves diverting additional motors to meet French and British requirements, even if further delay to production of American scouts results.

Seek Thousands of Motors

The British government, after careful investigation by the special expert sent over for that purpose, has been pressing steadily for some thousands of motors to be delivered for use in British machines.

The French experts, at first somewhat doubtful of the liberty motor, are now asking for and will receive engines by July 1. Difficulties with over-heating, alleged in a letter from Louis Cammen, read in the senate yesterday to make the liberty motor useless, are declared authoritatively to have been overcome. Radiator trouble was encountered, particularly when machines which had been operated successfully in northern latitudes, were taken south for tests. These have been corrected. It was stated and the lubrication system of the engine improved to the point where no further trouble on that score is anticipated.

Aircraft Delay Over

To support their view that the day of delays in aircraft production are over officials point to the fact that last month saw liberties delivered in hundreds and to present indications that the output will be more than doubled this month and steadily increased thereafter. The output last month, so far as known here, was greater than that of any foreign motor with the possible exception of one 120-horsepower type used in France. No high power motor approaching the liberty 450 figure was within sight of the American output. It was to reach that end in quantity production, it was declared, that the liberty was designed.

To Try Dispute

Another phase of the dispute about the success of the liberty motor promises to be settled soon by actual trial. That is its availability for use in single-seated fighting machines. Two machines of this type, one a sea-plane, have been designed and built in this country and will be ready for trial at an early date. They represent the first efforts ever made seriously to place such high power in single-seated, short-winged speed machines.

PORTLAND YOUTH ON CASUALTY LIST

WASHINGTON, May 15.—The casualty list today contained 120 names, including Stuart Freeman, 341 12th street, Portland, Ore., died of accident; Private William H. Andrews, Downey, Ida., wounded severely.

STEVENS IS CHOSEN HEAD OF G. A. R.

ALBANY, Ore., May 15.—T. H. Stevens of Portland was chosen department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic at the Oregon encampment today.

E. P. Sox, Albany, was elected senior vice-commander. Mrs. Bertha Drew Gilman, was elected president of the Women's Relief Corps. The ladies of the G. A. R. did not elect today.

The encampment voted it was a desecration of the flag to make slackers and pro-Germans kiss it.

AMSTERDAM, May 15.—A Vienna dispatch says that a special economic treaty between Rumania and the central empires provides that Rumania will sell to Germany and Austria-Hungary her surplus production in 1918 and 1919 of all kinds of grain, including oil seeds and also fodder, hlp, poultry, cattle, fibrous plants and wool. Rumania also agrees to sell this surplus to the central powers for a further period of seven years, if it should be required.

CLYDE BEATS WORLD'S RIVETING RECORD

LONDON, May 15.—The Clyde has beaten the London riveting record, according to the Daily Mail. Thomas Devine, a former soldier, at the Dalmuir yards of William Beardmore & Co., has driven 4122 rivets in a side of a ship in nine hours. The London record, made last week by Robert Farrant, was 4276 rivets in a tank in the same time. Devine's record was made after Colonel W. V. Faber, member of parliament for the west division of Hampshire, had offered in a letter to the Daily Mail 25 pounds sterling to the first riveter in the United Kingdom to beat Farrant's figures.

RUMANIAN TROOPS MARCH WEST

LONDON, May 15.—"Reports from Liege say that one cavalry division from Rumania has passed thru Liege going westward and that more troops from Rumania are expected on the Belgian front," says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Amsterdam.

"Orders have been given for all other traffic on the railways to stop in order to allow the troops to pass," the correspondent adds.

It is probable that the cavalry referred to by the correspondent belongs to the German forces which were operating in Rumania and have been released from that front thru the signing of the peace treaty between Rumania and the central powers.

SANTA FE MAKES FOUR MILLION GAIN

NEW YORK, May 15.—The Santa Fe railroad report for 1917, issued today, shows operating revenues of \$165,529,539, an increase of \$21,259,281 over 1916, largely offset, however, by expenses of \$195,272,778, an increase of \$16,809,192, leaving a net gain in operating revenues of \$4,429,839. Income on investments amounted to 6.52 percent, against 6.85 in 1916, which marked the high record for twenty years.

COMMONS TO DEBATE AUSTRIAN PEACE OFFER
