MEDFORD PARADE WILL INAUGURATE RED CROSS DRIVE

As a reminder that it is again time to loosen our purse strings and pour out the gold for the men who are shedding their blood in the interest of humanity, loyal Medford will again march down Main street Monday afternoon, May 20th, at 3 o'clock. The parade is not to be merely a finessed array to delight the eye of the curious, but it is intended as a solemn reminder of the duty and responsibility imposed upon us all to support with our moral and material offerings one of the greatest and noblest organizations that has ever ministered to suffering humanity, the American Red Cross.

The parade will inaugurate the drive in the Medford district for the raising of \$15,000, county contribution to the Red Cross. Notwithstanding the large representation in the Liberty parade last month, the chairman in charge of arranging for the Red Cross parade Monday reports enthusiastic responses from all the organizations so far asked to cooperate. This is characteristic of the people of Jackson county when they are called upon to work or to sacrifice in aid of America's part in the war.

Indications are that the demonstration will equal if not exceed the April Liberty loan parade. It is the duty of every available person to march as an example to the indifferent, and to arouse the fullest interest in the last man, woman, and child in a work so necessary to the success of the war, as well as to the welfare of the men who are fighting it for us. German arrived in Moscow today and related the details.

On the afternoon of April 28, he said, a German lieutenant led his troops into the hall at Kiev where the rada was sitting. "Hands up, in the name of the German government," was the order shouted by the soldiers. The detachment was reinforced by bayonets. All the members of the rada raised their hands except M. Grushviki, the presiding officer. He tried to continue the session, but was checked by the German lieutenant.

All Are Searched.

All the members of the cabinet and of the rada and even spectators were searched by the Germans. Some of them were tied, while others were

ordered to quit the hall. The government was declared to be at an end.

After the dissolution of the rada the landowners met in convention in Kiev and named General Socoropatsky head of the provisional government of the Ukraine pending an election of a national assembly. General Socoropatsky issued a temporary provisional constitution which made null all legislation passed by the Kerensky and Bolshevik regimes. Socoropatsky has dictatorial powers, including the right to appoint a prime minister and to veto laws.
