The members of the patrol entered or were assisted into an abandoned trench nearby and the soldiers prepared for a fight, believing one was certain to come. They waited in the darkness for half an hour for something to happen, but the Germans did not come out. The party then made its way cautiously back to the American line.

Full details of the action have not been received. It appears, however, that Lieutenant Edward Rickenbacker of Columbus, Ohio, answering an alarm shortly after daylight, encountered three enemy planes. He attacked them and shot one down three kilometers inside the enemy lines.

Lieutenant Rickenbacker, formerly an automobile racer, was decorated with the French war cross on Wednesday. He assisted in bringing down a German airplane in enemy territory two weeks ago.

DILLON ACCUSES BRITISH OF DECEIT ON HOME RULE

LONDON, May 17.—The house of commons adjourned last night until May 28 without any sign of long-delayed Irish home rule bill. Apparently the members of the government have no idea when the bill will be introduced.

DUBLIN, May 16.—At a meeting of 45 members of the Irish party here today with the Irish nationalist leader, John Dillon, presiding, a statement was issued to the effect that the bill for conscription in Ireland was adopted by parliament largely under the impression that no attempt would be made to use the power until a responsible Irish government and an Irish parliament were called into existence. The latest developments, however, lead to the conviction, the statement says, that the government has no intention of producing any bill whatever, that promises made were uttered simply for the purpose of deceiving the house of commons, the British public and above all, the American government, the American people and the allied European nations, and of prejudicing the cause of Ireland in their eyes.

25 HUN FLIERS BROUGHT DOWN ON BRITISH FRONT

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, May 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The third flying weather yesterday on the British front in Flanders constituted a bad period for the enemy air service. One British brigade alone up to 3 o'clock in the afternoon had destroyed 15 German planes and had driven six others down out of control, according to unofficial but reliable figures which the correspondent learned, and at least five other hostile machines were sent crashing down.

Today is another perfect day and it is certain to see many better clashes in the air.

Yesterday 25 German planes were wrecked and 12 others shot down out of control.

At 1 o'clock this morning and again at 3 o'clock there was a concentration of gun fire on a small section of the British front in the La Bassée-Merville sector. There was also severe shelling of Picant wood nearby, during the night.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The shortage of pennies and other small coins so acute a few months ago, has been entirely eliminated, Raymond T. Baker, director of the mint, reported today. By working the Philadelphia, San Francisco and Denver mints 24 hours a day, large quantities of one cent pieces, nickels, dimes, quarters and half dollars have been accumulated above the orders of the banks.

As the correspondent of the Associated Press travels up and down the front he is besieged constantly by friendly inquirers as to how American preparations are coming along. Sometimes there is a certain anxiety expressed, to be sure, but there is no impatience. Officers are loud in their praise of the work they understand already has been accomplished by America. Such troops as have been seen from the United States have pleased the veterans immensely, for the obvious reason—shape up well. It is felt that with an army of such material, victory is certain for the allies will hold the Germans until that army gets into action.

President Wilson has written to Hanson as follows: "Indirectly through a friend I have learned of all the circumstances of your joining the military forces of the United States and I want to send you my brief line to express my admiration of the spirit which prompted your action and prompted your whole course in connection with leaving your farm and throwing in your fortune entirely and unreservedly with the great country we all love and seek to serve."

ITALIAN DISCOVERS SUGAR IS CURE FOR TUBERCULOSIS

PARIS, May 17.—Professor Domenico Lo Monaco, director of the dichemical section of the Linceo academy at Rome, is credited by the Italian scientific press with a discovery which will revolutionize the treatment of tuberculosis.

Professor Lo Monaco, explaining his discovery, said he had observed that sugar had a remarkable effect on the secretions of the human organism. After seven years of study of these phenomena he became convinced that the secretions of saliva, bile and the gastric juices were modified profoundly by the introduction of sugar. This gave him the idea of applying this method to the bronchial secretions of consumptives.

The first experiments made on consumptive soldiers gave results far exceeding his expectations, he reports. There was rapid improvement in most cases and he made cures which appeared to be radical.

Professor Lo Monaco explained that the bronchial secretion is indispensable medium for existence of the tubercle bacilli and that an injection of saccharose secretion diminished the bacilli.

CONSTANTINOPLE, via Amsterdam, May 17.—Russian Bolshevik troops, reinforced from Turkestan and Astrakhan, have recaptured the port of Baku on the Caspian Sea. The Bolshevik forces crossed the Caspian sea on Russian gunboats and attacked the Mussulmans, who owing to lack of means of defense, were forced to abandon the town. The Bolshevik troops are vigorously continuing attacks.
