SINN FEINERS AWAIT ORDERS BEFORE REVOLTING

DUBLIN, Sunday, May 18.—The Sinn Feiners throughout Ireland, who had been waiting for two days for a cue as to what action to take, tonight received a proclamation from a party committee appointing new men to take the places of those arrested.

The effect of this proclamation probably will be to influence the Sinn Fein against any spontaneous outbreak. The police seems to be to sit tight and await orders of the newly appointed heads of the organization.

DUBLIN, Sunday, May 18.—The Sinn Fein, widow of Major John McBride, who was executed in May, 1916, for the part taken by him in the Dublin uprising on Easter that year, has been arrested.

A dispatch to the Times from Holyhead, says that 46 of the Sinn Fein prisoners arrived there on a ship Saturday night. They were searched for a camp. The Countess Mackenzie was seen in London. Other prisoners are expected at Holyhead.

With the exception of Professor De Yaker and Countess Mackenzie, who appeared to be departed, the prisoners did not seem to be disturbed.

GERMANS LOSE CONTROL OF AIR ON TOUL FRONT

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, May 19.—By the Aviation Service, control of the air in the Toul region is the Germans along the Toul sector. Aerial activity there seems to be increasing daily, but the Germans are not permitted to proceed south freely.

Fighting American aviators have been downing with the enemy, and today the tally of machines brought down is overwhelmingly in their favor. In fact, they have had such good fortune that they are wondering whether they can keep up without shame. They are not passing by a single machine to get at the enemy.

The German aviators have started on 15th week, at a great height, kept this morning, for instance, five of them came over the ground at 6,000 feet, 2,000 above the ordinary level of the "scrub." The Germans were very "scrubby," but the Germans were keeping a sharp lookout, and as they saw five American pursuit machines climbing to meet them, they turned and started home rapidly.

RED CROSS AT LAKE CREEK FEEDS FIVE HUNDRED

The Sunday chicken dinner held by the Lake Creek Red Cross auxiliary for the benefit of the Red Cross was a big success as hundreds of people from Medford and all parts of the county will testify.

The dinner was given at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lem Charley between Brownshore and Lake Creek.

About 500 people were in attendance and the price per plate was 50 cents. All the furniture was taken out of the lower part of the house to make room for the diners, and tables were fixed on the porch and in the yard.

It required over two hours to feed the multitude who were constantly arriving by auto and other vehicles. Cars were parked all about the yard and barn and for a great distance in both directions along the road.

The bountiful dinner was served on the caterer's plan, which system worked splendidly. All the edibles, etc., had been donated by the people of the Lake Creek district, so the money taken in was all profit.

It is estimated that the total receipts from the dinner and the auctioning of cakes and other things which followed, were about \$280. Mayor Gates of Medford auctioned off the cakes, several of which brought as high as \$5.25 each.

For some time the women of the Lake Creek auxiliary have been making socks for the soldiers from the raw wool which is donated by the residents of the district, and a striking feature of the dinner yesterday was the exhibit of the dinner yesterday was the exhibit of the old-fashioned spinning wheel and the wool combed cards, and the socks already made.

AIRCRAFT BOARD TAKEN FROM ARMY

WASHINGTON, May 19.—As his first act under the new act permitting executive rearrangement and consolidation of departments, President Wilson today took production of aircraft from the army signal corps and established as a separate organization the air production board headed by John D. Ryan of New York.

EX-CZAR NICHOLAS TO BE BANISHED TO SWITZERLAND

GENEVA, Switzerland, May 19.—Nicholas Romantoff, former emperor of Russia, and his family, according to reports printed in Vienna newspapers, has been given his choice of exile in Romania or Switzerland.

This concession, it is added, was granted by the soviet government on certain conditions, the principal one being that he would refrain from making efforts to return to the Russian throne.

MISERY RULES UKRAINE UNDER GERMAN RULE

Country Groaning From Hunger, Misery and Slavery—Thousands Attempting to Flee to Great Russia—Armed Population Resist German Aggression.

LONDON, May 20.—The ruthless methods of the Germans in attempting to gather foodstuffs in the Ukraine are meeting with bitter opposition from the exasperated population, according to a Russian government wireless message received here.

District assemblies throughout the Ukraine decided to burn all bread and other provisions. The land owners were declared to be outcasts.

Twenty thousand peasants attempted to hold an assembly of their own in Kiev, but they were dispersed by the Germans.

General Skoroupauski, the self-appointed hetman, has been declared an impostor by many Ukrainian organizations and the people have been ordered to disregard his decrees. Except for his bodyguard of 100 men, the hetman is said to have no troops at his disposal.

Country in Misery. Everywhere the Germans are appointing their own officials, while the country is groaning from hunger, misery and slavery. The Russian statement says that thousands are attempting to flee to Great Russia. The members of the rada are regarded as traitors.

Almost the entire population is armed. Attempts by the Germans to disarm the people are meeting with deadly resistance. Towns and villages are reported to have been burned.

The Germans, the statement adds, export to Germany all the provisions they can lay hands on, but there are no imports into the Ukraine. All the towns, villages and railway stations and cars are in darkness as there is no petroleum or candles.

Women in War Work

An urgent call has been made for dish towels and dish cloths, for use in the cantonments. The allotment made to the Jackson county chapter is 710 dish towels and 190 dish cloths. For dish towels sugar sacks of 100 pounds or flour sacks of 50 lbs. or larger should be made of these of smaller size containers of 10 to 50 lbs. All should be washed clean. No material should be purchased for this allotment and no chapter funds should be used. This allotment should be sent by June 15th. Any one who can assist in filling this allotment is asked to do so, as soon as possible.

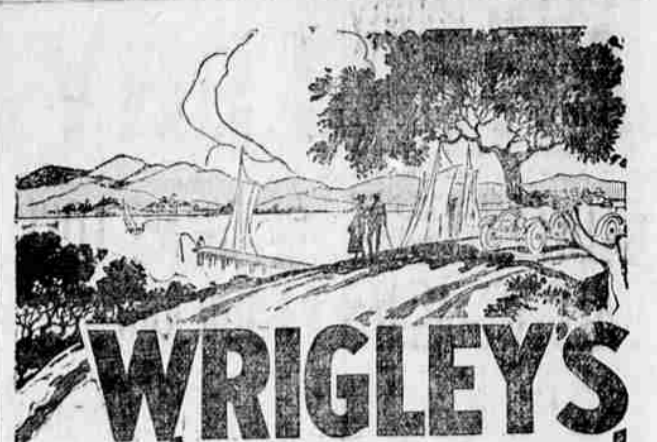
