THIRTY MEMBERS COMPANY SEVEN JOIN ARTILLERY

The Seventh company which went into service from Medford 109 men strong will soon be but a memory. There are now only 30 men left in the company of the original organization, as within the past few days 30 of the boys were transferred to a new artillery battalion that is being formed at Fort Stevens for service abroad just as soon as it can be equipped.

Thirty-two former members of the company are now in service in France in the 65th artillery. The members of the company still in service at Fort Columbia are envious of the 30 just transferred and are hoping for a similar transfer in the near future, as they are weary of garrison life and are pining for active service abroad.

Two of the 30 boys transferred to the new battery this week are Dean Stacy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. D. Stacy, and Horton J. Beeman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Beeman of Gold Hill, who arrived home yesterday afternoon on a furlough which was to have lasted until Sunday.

But to the bitter disappointment of the two soldiers and their relatives they received telegrams last night ordering them to return to Fort Stevens at once. They departed for the fort this morning.

The names of the other soldiers transferred to the new battalion are not yet known in Medford.

LAKE CREEK TO LEAD SUBSCRIPTION TO THE RED CROSS

Mr. Daniels gave out no figures as to the total so far contributed in the district or in the city of Medford, merely stating that the campaign was progressing favorably and that the various committees were hard at work thruout the district.

He again announced that when the drive is over a complete alphabetical list will be published in the newspapers of all subscribers and the amount each contributed.
