FOOD ECONOMY NECESSARY TO WIN WAR SAYS KERR

Through the short visit of President W. J. Kerr of the O. A. C. and his notable address before a big audience at the Page theater Sunday forenoon Medford people have a broadened vision of the seriousness of the war and have become imbued therefore more than ever before with the necessity of making sacrifices to win the war.

The imperative necessity of sacrifice, notably in the matter of food conservation, especially of wheat, was impressed upon the audience by President Kerr, who only recently returned from a conference at Washington with President Wilson and other government leaders and is making a speaking tour for the government setting forth the peril of the present situation and urging upon the people to unite and aid and back up the government and army.

At the conclusion of the address, the big audience arose in a pledge to abstain entirely from the use of wheat for the next five days at least.

Will Win the War. The speaker eloquently made it plain that the food supply of the United States, if wisely husbanded and distributed to our allies, especially France and Italy will win the war, and asserted that unless we could get enormous quantities of wheat to France and Italy there was grave danger that those hungry nations will collapse and of dire necessity surrender their opposition to Germany.

happen, it was pointed out that Germany could then annihilate the British army, and next would fall upon the comparatively small army of the United States at the war front and vent all her unbridled fury against America.

In the opinion of all the military experts at Washington, President Kerr said, if France and Italy collapsed through lack of food, the war would be brought by Germany to this country, and it would require an army of from 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 men to fight off the invaders.

Food Solves Problem. Whereas now if France, Italy and the other allies, can be provided by this country with enough wheat and other food to tide them over until fall, an American army of only 5,000,000 in co-operation with the allies can win the war.

Therefore the great peril in the situation that now faces us and makes imperative the conservation of wheat and other foods.

France, the speaker said, through insufficient food supplies was in danger of a collapse, and if such a dire calamity happened, Italy would collapse within 24 hours thereafter. Then Germany would unite all her efforts to annihilating the British

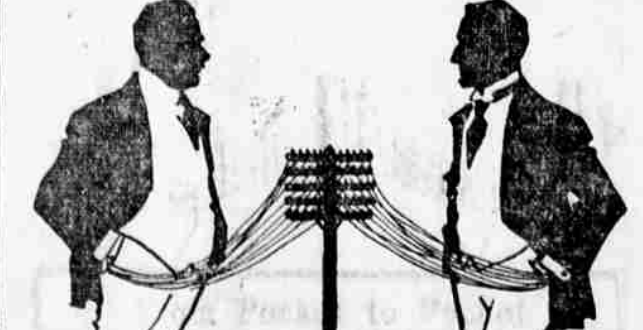

army, and after that would hurl all her strength against the United States, the wealthiest and most powerful nation, both from hatred and a desire to reconquer her great war financial losses and expenses by conquering this country and wringing from it enormous indemnity.

Italy and France in Need. The speaker pointed out that Russia's collapse was caused by the lack of food. France and Italy must have food and wheat from this country at once. Italy has plenty of man power, but lacks food. France, he asserted is almost at the last extremity of the matter of men and food.

The normal consumption of wheat in the United States is 40 millions of bushels a month, and the wheat supply now on hand means only a supply of about fourteen million bushels a month, President Kerr stated. And we must send all this wheat to France and Italy to tide over those countries and keep them going until fall.

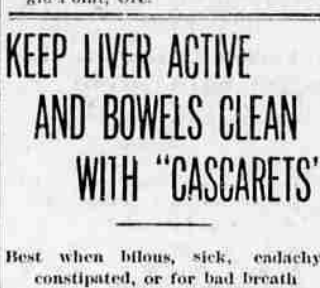
