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## WAR GARDEN MEETING TONIGHT AT CITY LIBRARY

A war gardens meeting to which all people interested in gardens and the insects which prey on them, will be held at 8 o'clock tonight at the public library, which will be addressed by M. D. Butler, representative of the department of agriculture, who has charge of the war garden work in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The subject of his address will be "Control of Insects and Conservation of Gardens."

"I find the war garden situation in Oregon very encouraging," said Mr. Butler, who has just completed a tour of the state. "All people who can do so are planting gardens for economic reasons. The interest in gardening, of course, varies in different communities. Where a community goes in heavily for war gardening that helps win the war, especially in helping out the transportation problem. For if a community can raise its own vegetable needs less stuff has to be shipped in to it."

"The big thing to bear in mind in southern Oregon in the way of gardening is the extermination of insects. It is poor economy to work hard and make a fine garden only to have the stuff planted eaten up or stunted by insects."

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## SCHOOLS TO OFFER ARMY TRAINING COURSE IN FALL

Military training will be a part of the course at the Medford high school next year. This move was decided on by the school board at a special meeting last night when Melvin Ellstad, who has been acting as manual training instructor for the past month, was hired as the regular instructor in manual training and military training for the next school year. The military training course will be elective, but it is expected that every boy student of the school will gladly enroll for it next fall. Credits will be allowed to those taking this course, and besides the military knowledge to be gained there will be a big benefit from the physical exercises incidental thereto.

The military training course is designed by the school board to in a way take the place of football now that because of the war there are no big students in the school.

The board contemplates leasing the large hall in the natatorium for the year for use in connection with the military training and the general physical activities of the schools.

Mr. Ellstad is well qualified to conduct the course in military training as he has had five years military training, and leaves Sunday for the presidio at San Francisco to take the month's officers' training course which will be attended by many other O. A. C. students and graduates.

The board last night also began the preparation of the annual school budget which will be voted on at the coming school election, June 17. Two new members of the board will be elected at that time as the elective term of Mr. Palmer will expire this year, as will also the term of W. A. Folger, who was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board. It is understood that Mr. Folger will not be a candidate for election, and that President Palmer is as yet undecided whether to become a candidate for reelection.
