JITNEY STRIKES BOY—UNCONSCIOUS

The hopes of the resentful defenders were fully realized and the result completely satisfied the Americans, for in one french at day break this morning lay the nine dead Germans who perished in the bayonet attack, while to the east where the men in the trenches had gone to work with their machine guns the ground was dotted with gray clad bodies.

Many of the machine gunners, still wearing their gas masks, stuck to their guns throughout the preliminary bombardment and when they saw the advancing forms of the Germans just outside the American wire they cut loose with their fire.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Approval by President Wilson of a policy of supervision over the meat packing industry without actual government operation, unless enforcement of regulatory measures is found to be impossible, was announced today by the food administration.

MEMORIAL DAY QUIETLY OBSERVED THROUGH VALLEY

In keeping with the seriousness of the times and in accordance with President Wilson's proclamation to make the day one of public humiliation, fasting and prayer, the Memorial celebration in Medford today was one of the quietest in years.

At 10 a. m. there was a short parade from the city park to the Page theater, where a patriotic program was observed under the auspices of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. In the line of march the G. A. R. and W. R. C. organizations had the post of honor with company F, Oregon State Guards, formerly the home guard, as escort. Root's band and Chief Marshal Lawton headed the parade, in which also marched the Improved Order of Red Men, the Boy Scouts, the Elks and school children.

The patriotic program at the Page followed the parade, the chief feature of which was an eloquent address by Rev. Dr. J. C. Rollins. The program was interspersed with orchestral music and instrumental selections, vocal selections and readings, including Lincoln's Gettysburg address.

At 2 p. m. the G. A. R., W. R. C. and citizens generally decorated the graves of the soldiers in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

RESERVE CHECKING HUN RUSH.

To the southeast the French reserves are coming into play along the roads from Soissons to Sartennes-Et-Traux, seven miles southeast of Soissons.

Fere-en-Tardenois, eight and one-half miles southeast of Hartennes-et-Traux, apparently marks the limit of the German advance toward the southwest, with Vesilly ten and one-half miles eastward, representing the extreme southeasterly progress of the enemy.

Present Defense Line

From Vesilly, the front tends sharply northward. Brouillet is the next point mentioned in the official communication and it lies 3 1/2 miles north of Vesilly and only slightly to the east of a north and south line running through the town.

Brouillet is 13 miles southeast of Rheims, and along the ten mile line from that point to Thill, three miles east of Rheims and thence trending northeastward above the cathedral city, the Franco-British defensive line is reported to have broken all the German assaults and to have maintained the front intact.

On New Territory.

The fighting is almost entirely on territory untouched by the war since 1914. Berlin claims the number of prisoners has increased to 25,000.

Except for some sharp fighting at Cantigny where the Americans have repulsed German counter-attacks against their new positions, there has been little fighting on the line north from Soissons. A local German attack against the French north of Mont Kemmel on the Lys battlefield was repulsed completely.

On Flanders Front.

On the Flanders front the Germans

made a local attack on a British position northwest of Festubert, in the Glivency sector, which met with a complete repulse. The British improved their line by an advance of some 200 yards in the Morris sector, to the northwest.

Still further attacks have been made against the Americans established in the village of Cantigny, west of Montdidier, which they recently captured.

French Official Report.

PARIS, May 30.—The battle along the fighting front continued all night with the French maintaining the western outlets of Soissons, the war office announced today.

Northwest of Rheims the Franco-British forces broke all the German assaults and maintained the defensive positions.

French reserves are continuing to arrive on the front and the German advance is being rested with great tenacity.

The Germans made repeated attacks to break thru the defense in the Soissons region but were each time held up by the determined French resistance.

In the center of the German advance fighting is taking place in the neighborhood of Vesilly (approximately 18 miles south of Chemin-Des-Dames, where the German attack was launched on Monday.)
