So trumpeted bold Drake and raked the host. Of Phillip's Armada from England's coast.

And saved the western world. So, too, The Iron Duke spoke at fateful Waterloo.

"Not even a Napoleon shall pass!" To tread the nations into withered grass.

And was it all for naught? Shall one mad fool. Crush us to powder that his will shall rule.

And make the world a sacrifice to Mars? No! It is left in the eternal stars.

GERMANY'S ARCTIC DRIVE.

SWEDEN, after long delay and much German inspired hostile criticism, has signed a commercial agreement with the United States and the allies whereby more than 300,000 tons of Swedish shipping are released for allied use in exchange for needed supplies.

German pressure prevented the signing of the agreement months ago, despite the dire need of Sweden but proof of a comprehensive plan by Germany for the conquest and annexation of Finland and the creation of a German Greater Finland to seize part of Russia and probably part of Sweden has caused a reversal of Swedish sentiment.

The Stockholm paper, which first printed the revelations of Prince Liechtenowsky, German ambassador to Great Britain at the outbreak of the war, proving conclusively that the kaiser alone was responsible for starting the war, has recently printed statements from prominent Finnish leaders, now in Berlin, as representatives of the Finnish government in its negotiations with Germany, confirming German plans in Finland. These plans are thus outlined:

- 1. The carrying of the war to the Arctic circle, the seizure of the Murman railroad, running from Petrograd to Kola, Russia's new port on the Arctic Ocean, and the occupation of Lapland, Russian Karelia, and the Finnish coast of the Arctic and the White Seas.

2. The extension of the pan-German dream of a "Mitteleuropa" to include a through railway line from the northernmost cape of Europe to Constantinople.

3. An alliance between Finland, Germany and Japan which will renew the war against Russia, giving Petrograd to Germany and Siberia to Japan.

The program included the capture of Helsingfors and Petrograd by the German Baltic commander and the creation of a "Greater Finland" including Petrograd and the new railroad constructed since the war began from the Russian capital to the Murman coast.

The new Finland, greater than Norway, Sweden and Denmark combined, is to be bounded on the southwest by a German Estonia, and other Germanized Baltic provinces and Germany is to be given a free harbor on the Arctic sea in Finland. A German prince will rule "Greater Finland," which is to be dominated economically and politically by Germany.

A number of obstacles are faced in the consummation of the scheme. Sweden threatens war rather than abandon the Aland isles. British troops have been landed on the Murman coast to protect the railway and prevent the seizure of Kola Bay ports, while British warships are guarding the harbor.

When the big battle on the western front is over, Germany will be ready to begin the conquest of the Arctic, renew the war on the Bolshevik and approach Japan for an alliance for the division of Russia.

SEDITIONOUS HELENA SALOON MEN JAILED

HELENA, Mont., May 31.—Seven well known men, John and Joe Miley, saloonmen; August Lembrecht, blacksmith; Frank Helly and Tony Deidtmann, saloon employees; Leo Reno, lunch room tender and Adam Stek, bartender, were arrested here today on felony charges, and accused of uttering seditious statements.

They were arrested on bench warrants issued on information filed in the district court, and bail in all cases was fixed at \$5,000. Officials have been working on the cases for some time.

U-BOAT BOMBARDS SPANISH MERCHANTMEN

WASHINGTON, May 31.—News of the shelling of the Spanish steamer Maria Pia, which caused the death of her captain and several passengers, reached here today in diplomatic dispatches. The vessel reached a Spanish port after the encounter.

HIGHWAY BUILDER TRIED FOR SEDITION

HELENA, Mont., May 31.—The state council of defense today began a hearing behind closed doors on the charges impugning the loyalty of Oscar Robn, chairman of the state highway commission, and a prominent Butte mine operator, and also involving, according to the council, "some of the matters of complaint," upon which a protest against the re-appointment of B. K. Wheeler as United States district attorney was sent in to Washington at a conference of the state and county councils of defense.

Butte mining men, secret service agents and special agents of the department of justice are here as witnesses. The hearing will continue several days.

SEATTLEITE HELD AS GERMAN AGENT

SEATTLE, May 31.—Ludwig Kann, president of Lutz & Kann, Inc., wholesale hair goods merchants of Seattle, was held in jail here today without bail having been arrested last night following the filing of a complaint charging that he had conspired to give the German government information regarding American forces and defenses.

The complaint was filed by Assistant United States Attorney B. L. Moore. Kann is said to be a naturalized American of German birth.

SERIOUS DISTURBANCES IN AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Serious disturbances are reported in Austria in official dispatches from Switzerland. Foreigners, it is declared, are not permitted to enter the country. The disorders are attributed, the dispatches said, to socialists and Jugoslavs.

GREAT BRITAIN'S FOOD SUPPLY NOW NORMAL

WASHINGTON, May 31.—British workmen, whose meat ration during the past few weeks dropped almost to the vanishing point, now are back on the normal allowance, under the compulsory rationing system. A cablegram to the food administration from the British ministry of food today announced that this had been made possible "thanks to the splendid response from America."

Supplies of butter and cheese still are short in England, but imports from the United States are expected to relieve that situation also. No reserve of any food is in sight, however, in spite of the decreased consumption which has accompanied strict enforcement of rationing.

During April the United States sent to England 358,658,000 pounds of beef and pork products, compared with 181,995,000 pounds in April 1917 and 43,700,000 pounds in the same month of 1914, before the war began.

1800 RAILROAD SHOPMEN STRIKE

MOLINE, Ill., May 31.—Eighteen hundred employes in the Silvis shops of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad walked out today to enforce a demand for Director General McAdoo for revision of the recent wage scale award. The men want 75 cents an hour minimum and time and a half for overtime on an eight-hour basis. The wage award fixed the minimum of 55 cents an hour. Appeals of Superintendent Millinix and other officials were of no avail. Monday the men wired demands to Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The railroad administration announced today that it would send a representative immediately to Moline, Ill., to investigate the walkout at the Rock Island Silvis shops of 1,800 shopmen.

RIVER MARNE IS GOAL OF GERMANS

LONDON, May 31.—A dispatch from Reuter's correspondent at French headquarters, says that on the flanks at Soissons and Rheims the Germans are throwing their entire strength southward, obviously with the Marne for their goal. It is probable that the Germans hope to establish themselves on the Marne, with a view to turning the direction of their main effort westward, trusting to the river to protect their right flank.

The highest fighting is proceeding along the whole southern front of the advance. The report, which was sent at noon, said that this morning it had been learned for the first time that the reserve units were engaged in support of the divisions which had borne the whole weight of the onslaughts since Monday.

PACT AGREED BETWEEN SWEDEN AND ALLIES

STOCKHOLM, May 31.—The agreement between Sweden and the entente allies for a supply of foodstuffs and other vital necessities in return for Swedish tonnage, is completely acceptable to all shades of opinion. Germany did her utmost to delay negotiations, but Sweden succeeded in carrying out her part, owing to Germany's pressing need of wood pulp and iron ore.

The negotiations finally took the shape of a contest between the Americans and Germany, as it is learned that they were carried out under the leadership of America and thru the American legation here.
