

KAISER SEEKS TO TURN EUROPE UPON AMERICA

Teutons Turn Vials of Hate From England Upon This Country—Minister of War Suggests Union of Europe to Fight United States and Great Britain. Press Exaggeration.

AMSTERDAM, May 31.—Germany has now turned the vials of its hate from England upon America.

Since the German people have come to realize that the army of General Pershing is not the "contemptible" force they were led to believe it was, their prayer has been changed from "Gott strafe England" to "Gott strafe Amerika."

The Yankoes are no longer called a "phantom army;" they are now "a menace to the whole world," in the comments of the German press.

The Cologne Volkszeitung goes so far as to predict a general European war against America after the present conflict.

World's Greatest Enemy.

It says:

"The world's greatest enemy is American mammonism, to which, so long as it secures its monstrous profits, the butchery of entire nations is nothing but a practical means to an end.

"It is high time that to combat this murderous and unspcakably devilish financial might, which would gladly see mankind swimming in blood until 1921, all belligerents as well as neutral peoples were called upon to unite in an anti-American campaign.

"Only a speedy peace can save England and France from the fate with which America would like to overwhelm the whole of Europe.

"A general European war of defense against America must form from the final chapter of the world war, if Europe does not wish to abandon forever her role in the universal development of the world's civilization. Up, then, ye nations of kultur, against the common enemy who stands grinning with satanic mien on the other side of the Atlantic."

General Von Stein, the kaiser's minister of war, has given official sanction to this propaganda of late by expressing similar views in an interview in "Der Tag," in which he says:

"The talk about a peace by reconciliation is still going on. I can only see one way to arrive at a compromise between two belligerents. It is when both, to avoid greater dangers, make peace so they may be able to turn against a third party.

Press Exaggeration.

"The whole of the continental powers, for example, might unite in a common stand against England and America—a course which they would certainly adopt were their statesmen gifted with sufficient acumen to understand the situation."

Every little skirmish with the American army at the front is turned by the German press into "a bloody American defeat."

Max Osborn, correspondent of the Vossische Zeitung, in a characteristic dispatch, says the "boxing methods" of the "sport-steered" American soldiers can do nothing against the war-tried "incomparables" from the Rhine.

Mow Them Down.

"One by one we mow them down," shrieks Karl Rosner in the Lokat-Anzeiger. "First we put the Anglo-French auxiliaries, the Portuguese, out of action, and now the Yankoes."

But some other critics do not consider the Americans quite so insignificant as adversaries. The Vossische Zeitung says editorially:

"We shall have to act and act with much more enterprise and determination than we have hitherto shown, if we would realize our best hopes before the American forces, whatever be their nature, can have time to take any serious part against us."

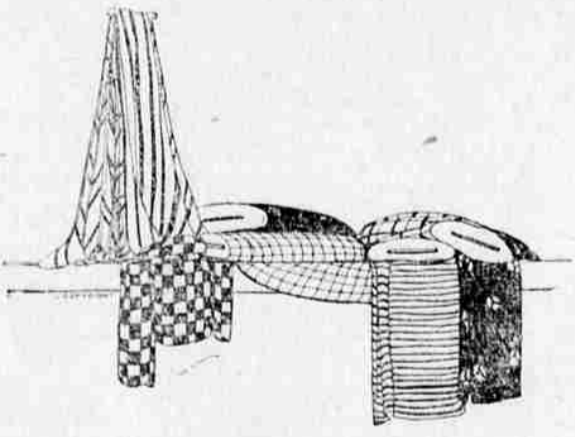
