YANKEES DEFEAT RAID AT LUNEVILLE

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—An American combat patrol engaged in a desperate fight with a large enemy patrol near Anceville, in the Luneville sector early today. The American losses were slight. The German casualties are not known.

During the fight the Americans found themselves being surrounded by overwhelming numbers but managed to extricate themselves and retire fighting all the while. It is believed certain that punishment was inflicted upon the enemy by the grenades and rifle fire of the Americans.

AMERICAN GUNNERS DEFENDED THIERRY

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY ON THE MARNE, June 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—American machine gunners only an hour or so after their arrival on the banks of the river Marne on the 31st of May took a most active part in the defense of Chateau Thierry which was then menaced with imminent capture by the Germans.

BURNS OF DAYTON TO GIVE PATRIOTIC LECTURE AT PAGE

"Wake Up, America," is the title of the great patriotic war lecture which will be delivered in Medford, Friday evening, June 14, at 8:15 at the Page theater. The lecture is to be given under the auspices of the Council of Defense.
