## Women in War Work

Annie W. Goodrich, just appointed dean of the army school of nursing which will train student nurses in connection with military hospitals, has issued thru the American Red Cross the following call to nurses to enroll for military hospitals and to young women to become student nurses in training schools:

"To every member of our profession the call goes out today that permits of no hesitation in response from each and every one of us needed where war service can best be rendered. Whether abroad in great military hospitals of our training camps or in the civil community, in a great measure left for each of us to decide. Let us immediately make our decision then throw ourselves mind and body to the task which this field brings. To every young woman free to give her time and strength goes an appeal for our sick and wounded men and from the sick in our civil communities which should command her highest service and that service is most immediately and fully rendered thru the training schools of our army or civil hospitals.

"We know that our young women will answer nobly to this call of their country as did their brothers. (Signed) "ANNIE W. GOODRICH.

"I am informed that on the 3rd of June it is the intention of the American Red Cross to start a drive for nurses in the army. The American Red Cross is the greatest recruiting agency for army nurses, and thru this agency I wish to appeal to the nurses of the country to enroll for service in the nurses' corps of the army. The need of a great number of nurses is acute, and any assistance the American Red Cross can render this department in obtaining for the army nurse corps the number of nurses required will be a genuine service to the country. ## CLASS OF 1918 REGISTERING FOR ARMY SERVICE

The registration of all young men of 21 years who have become of age since June 5th, 1917, is being held today in Jackson county. The registration hours are from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. No figures on the registration can be obtained until late Thursday as there are eight places of registration scattered at central points throughout the county. The estimate of the government is that Jackson county has 141 young men subject to this registration, based on 10 per cent of the county's total draft registration, but it is thought the number of registrants will fall far below this number because of so many young men having enlisted. Up to 3 p. m. today nine young men had registered personally at the exemption board headquarters, and the board had received 15 filled-out registration cards by mail, several of which were from out of town.

## YANKEES DO EFFECTIVE WORK.

Americans dug in and went at it like experienced hands. One of the American officers said:

"The Germans are now learning that the Americans are resourceful. The Germans do not like the Americans because they can dig in with one hand and fight with the other and smile at the same time."

In the villages along the Marne the Americans are aiding the French in guarding the homes of the civilians who were driven out by the enemy shelling by day and bombing by night. Many of these hitherto peaceful villages are almost deserted.

The battle area presented a peculiar and impressive picture this morning. The correspondent had motored all night in the rear of the front where the low rumble of guns was followed by flashes along the battle line and shrapnel bursting against a starry sky which seemed filled with enemy airplanes. There was a full at dawn and the clouds melted into silvery patches. The rays of the sun shone upon the battle field where for a moment it might have been imagined the hell by night had been turned into peace by day.

WASHINGTON.—A hearing of west coast lumbermen set for tomorrow before the price fixing committee of the war trade board has been postponed. An announcement of the board tonight merely said the postponement had been asked by the lumbermen.

## INFERTILE EGGS MOST DESIRABLE

As a part of the government's campaign for increased production and the conservation of foodstuffs, poultrymen and women are asked to cooperate in the production of infertile eggs. To this end the week beginning June 3rd, has been designated as "Can the Cockerel" week and all poultry keepers and farmers are asked to comply with the following recommendations.

1. All surplus cockerels, culls and undesirable adult males should be disposed of either by sale or by killing and use on home table or canning for future consumption. Young cockerels should be disposed of as soon as they reach marketable size, i. e. from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds.

2. Males to be retained as breeders should be separated from females as soon as possible and kept in separate quarters until again needed as breeders.

Every male bird carried through the year costs approximately \$3 to feed—without return in any form. On farms having only ordinary stock it is highly desirable to dispose of all adult males at once. However, farmers should not dispose of all old males which have proven good breeders, but they should be separated from the laying stock. Much better fertility will result next spring.

Arrangements have been made with the Medford Poultry company to exchange pullets for cockerels. This company will also make a special price on cockerels this week to assist in the movement.
