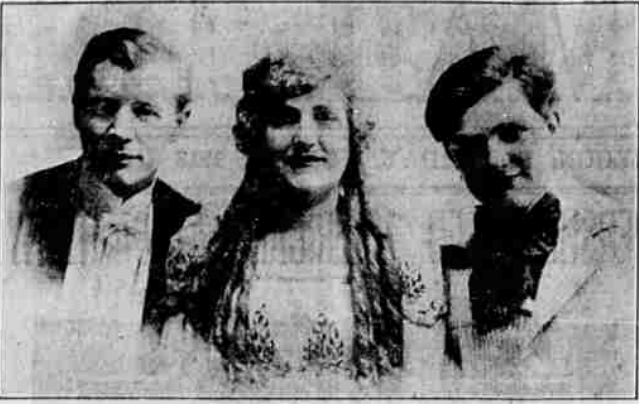

GERMANS DESTROY HUNDRED CHURCHES SOISSON DISTRICT

PARIS, June 7.—The bishop of Soissons who is now in Paris, today described the havoc wrought in the district of Soissons by the recent attack of the Germans. He said 100 churches had been razed to the ground by the Germans and that at least 100 others had been pillaged and partially demolished. The famous cathedral of Soissons suffered severely.

The bishop added that the Germans knew neither faith nor law; they knew nothing but war and pillage. They were methodically stripping and carrying away everything, he said.

The bishop also asserted that women, children and old men had been brutally murdered by German aviators, who flew over and with their machine guns fired upon long lines of refugees on country roads.

SAWMILL NEAR EUGENE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

EUGENE, Ore., June 8.—The sawmill of the Fischer Lumber company, three miles back of Marcola on the Mohawk branch of the Southern Pacific, 18 miles from Eugene was destroyed by fire between 2 and 3 o'clock this morning. The origin of the fire is unknown. The mill had a capacity of 60,000 feet of lumber.

Most of German shock divisions used in the Marne battlefield have been withdrawn from that area.

Many Trench Raids

Americans, with the French, have made trench raids along the left bank of the Avre river in the Montdidier sector. These raids have been carried out with good effect and enemy works have been destroyed as well as several prisoners captured.

Everywhere the American troops are rapidly becoming accustomed to every phase of the war. They are showing initiative and dash which has been repeatedly commented upon by veteran French and British soldiers, who welcome their appearance.

WORLD'S RECORD IN SHIP BUILDING MADE

ORANGE, Tex., June 8.—What is claimed to be the world's record in shipbuilding was eclipsed this morning at the National shipyard here, when the work of erecting 79 frames in one of the world's largest wooden steamships was accomplished in 30 hours and 35 minutes. This beats the world's record made on the Pacific coast where 79 frames of similar size and type were erected in 44 hours, it is claimed here.
