CONTINUE WORK ON ALASKAN RAILWAY

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Continuation of the work of the Alaskan railway was virtually reassured today when sub-committee of the house appropriations committee recommended additional funds. The appropriation will enable the present force of approximately 3,000 workmen to continue the work.

The sub-committee has not approved the full estimate of \$7,300,000 but assurance was given that enough would be provided to construct the line well toward Fairbanks, the objective of the project. The general plan calls for rehabilitation of the Northern Alaskan railway which is a part of the comprehensive scheme for development of the line.

TO EXTEND DRAFT LAW TO MEN OF 45

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Amendments to extend the draft law to all men between the ages of 18 and 45 were offered by Senator Cummins of Iowa and France of Maryland, today, when the senate military committee began consideration of the twelve billion dollar army appropriation bill passed by the house. The committee decided to hold hearings on the bill, and Secretary Baker will appear next Monday.

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TIME TO SPRAY FOR CODLING MOT SAYS PATHOLOGIST

From all indications over 95 per cent of the first brood of codling moth have emerged and deposited eggs. A few eggs have been hatching but on account of the cold weather, up to a few days ago, only a small percentage of the eggs layed were hatched. But, it is possible for the moths that are out now to cause more damage than the greater number of moths that were out earlier in the season. All fruit should be kept thoroughly covered with arsenate of lead for the next two or three weeks. Orchards sprayed two weeks ago should be sprayed again next week. Use arsenate of lead paste or two pounds to 50 gallons of water or arsenate of lead powder—one pound to 50 gallons of water. Nictene sulphate, one pint to 100 gallons may be combined with either paste or powdered lead. It will not be necessary to use lime of sulphur in this application.

The "Friend Gun Nozzle" has been tried out and found to be very satisfactory and I believe it will do very effective work when used with pumps of high pressure capacity. It is necessary to have the fruit covered with spray at this time in order to prevent serious infection from the first brood and the percentage of wormy fruit will depend upon the thoroughness of this application because every worm that gets through this spray will mean a great many more in the second brood.
