BLIND "ANZAC" SIGHT RESTORED BY AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A simple operation on the vertebrae of the neck performed here recently by two Washington osteopaths, Dr. R. D. Moore and Dr. Carl Kettler, has restored to an "Anzac" private, Thomas Skehill, his sight, lost through a shell explosion at the battle of Gallipoli in the early months of the war. Examination of Skehill, who has been lecturing throughout the country in the interests of the Third Liberty loan, showed a vertebra at the head of the spinal column slightly out of position. A correction easily was made, with the result that the blindness was dissipated. Physicians explained that the displaced vertebra had impaired functions of nerves indispensable to the sight. The blind man is said to have left Australia for this country a few weeks ago, reaching here in May. He has been treated for blindness in many lands and had given up all hope of a cure. His reason for calling on the Washington doctor was only to obtain relief for recurrent neck pains. At the end of some 20 minutes' manipulation, however, the patient remarked on seeing intermittent flashes of light, and finally astounded the osteopaths and the fellow soldier who had brought him to the office by announcing joyfully that he could see. For some time after the operation he was color blind, but even this was dispelled in a few hours. The operation was also followed by a partial loss of memory, but this also has now disappeared. He has enabled him the joyful news to his mother. Before the war Skehill was a government employe in Victoria, Australia. He enlisted when only 19 years of age and was in active service for more than two years.

REGISTRATION OF ALIEN WOMEN

The registration of German alien women residents of Medford and vicinity in accordance with the order issued by the government, was begun by Chief of Police Hittson in his office in the Commercial club building this morning. The hours of registration are from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. daily up to and including July 29. Up to early this afternoon only one woman had registered of the eight or twelve who must do so. The American wives of male German alien residents are classed by the government as German aliens and must register. In addition to registering, each German alien woman must furnish four photographs of herself and have her finger-prints taken.

REDDY DEVELOPING CHROME IN KLAMATH

The Siskiyou News of Yreka in its last issue in an article on the great chrome mining development in Siskiyou county contains the following item of interest about a well known Medford citizen: J. F. Reddy, of Medford, Ore., who for years has been interested in mining in northern California and southern Oregon, has purchased and leased several chrome mines between Hamburg and Seid on the north side of the Klamath river. At present he is working 40 men and looking for more. His chief operations are in Seid valley but he is opening several of his claims located near Hamburg, all of which look to be producers. However, the unusually early spring will greatly increase the attendance."

Mr. Parkhurst with his daughter and several guests and a number of employes for the Crater Lake hotel concessions arrived in the city Sunday evening from Portland. They came on a big auto truck and two passenger cars, having left Portland Saturday morning at 4 o'clock. The party will leave for the lake Tuesday morning and will at once open the Anna Springs camp hotel at headquarters and the lodge hotel at the rim of the lake.

Theodore Schwaben of San Francisco, a hotel man of exceptional ability will be in charge of the lodge this season. He will arrive in the city Tuesday morning.

Mr. Parkhurst announces that two new 16-passenger White auto buses of the national park type will be operated between Medford and Crater lake this year during the season. The 16-passenger car which operated on this run last year will run between Kirk on the Klamath side and the lake.

Will G. Steel, the Crater Lake park commissioner, will depart for the lake with the Parkhurst party tomorrow to remain there all summer.

MOST CHARMING MUSICAL COMEDY OF SEASON TONIGHT

Without the least risk of committing the sin of extravagant praise, "Oh, Boy," which is presented at the Page tonight, can be hailed as a production unequalled in the realm of girl and music shows. There is a delightful finish and smooth efficiency in every detail of the performance. These confer an easy distinction on this Broadway success and make it simple to understand why New Yorkers clamored and are still clamoring to see it.

"Oh, Boy" is frothy and frivolous, but in a different way than its pert title might lead one to suppose. It is not a big, blaring musical show, with battalions of chorus girls and choruses, or tons of scenery.

Pleasing Farce. It is a pleasing farce deftly performed by players endowed with an abundance of ability and personal charm, with musical numbers of the kind that everyone is trying to hum or whistle today. Some of the more popular numbers have preceded the show.

Continuing the song of praise, there is not a crude or ill-considered episode in the performance. Songs, dances, dialogue and situations all bear the stamp of exquisite finish. A pleasant glow is induced at the outset and this delightful condition is sustained in the audience every second.
