Women in War Work

Through the courtesy of Mr. Pigeon, the workers at Red Cross will be the spots of the Shasta twice a week during the warm weather for cool drinks in the afternoon. This kindness is greatly appreciated by the women, and will be thoroughly enjoyed.

The allotment for knitted garments has just been received, and by Sept. 1st, one hundred sweaters and 765 pairs of socks are to be made. The yarn for this work has been shipped and will be given out to the knitters as soon as it arrives.

Material for making 200 kits and housewives for the soldiers has been received. These are to be finished and returned within two weeks from date.

A special allotment has been received—the making of 300 housewives and kits, which are to be finished and returned within two weeks. The contents of the kit will be furnished at division headquarters but the housewife is to be outfitted here.

Surgical dressings instructors' certificates will not be issued after July 1st. Changes in specifications of surgical dressings, the large amount of certificates already granted, and the large number of new dressings make it desirable that instruction in changes in dressings be handled hereafter according to plans that will be announced when the next new dressings are asked for.

National headquarters has rated that instructors can no longer create instructors. The general purpose of the home service work of the Red Cross is to see that the dependents of soldiers and sailors shall be able to live under proper conditions while the wage earner is fighting. And everything possible will be done to assure the physical and moral well being of these families.
