Membership in the Jackson County Limit club is steadily increasing. Six people subscribed for the \$1,000 limit in stamps yesterday and another member was added to the list this morning, making 87,000 in subscriptions since the first day's canvass made on Monday, and an \$18,000 grand total for the club. Spurred on by the record set by the solicitors bringing in these splendid subscriptions, War Stamp solicitors throughout the county today are looking for the patriotic man with sufficient means to join the limit club.

Yesterday Big Day

Yesterday's grand total of the War Stamp sales for the two days' canvass was \$13,500, the second day's work almost equalling the mark set on the big opening day. The fact that the limit club amount is larger than the total amount of the new clean up campaign started Monday is due to the fact that a number of Limit club subscriptions were made prior to the beginning of the new campaign.

Over the Top

With three days left to raise the War Stamp quota and every district committee in the county putting forth its best efforts, County Chairman Hart has little doubt of the ability of his organization to put Jackson county over the top. Already Tolo has passed its quota while Kenwood district No. 102 under the management of Weldon Bidde reported over the top this morning with \$2,258.

Celebration Friday

Preparations for the free entertainment and patriotic meeting celebration at the Page and Rialto theaters are complete. Mayor C. F. ... and ... Collins will preside at the Rialto while C. M. Thomas and C. M. Kidd will have charge at the Page theater. Professor Roubt's Boys' Band will play several selections during both programs which commence at 8 o'clock and Captain Jimmy of the Boy Scouts will have his organization in charge of the ushers' duties at both play houses. RAILROAD CONTROL PERIOD EXTENDED

WASHINGTON, June 26.—After amending an act to prohibit relinquishment of federal control over one railroad while control over a competing line is retained, the senate interstate commerce committee today ordered favorably reported a resolution extending from July 1, 1918, until January next, the period provided in the railroad control act during which the government can return carriers to private ownership.

FIRE DESTROYS WOOD CUT FOR ASYLUM

SALEM, Ore., June 26.—Driven by a high wind, the fire which started in an unknown manner in the state penitentiary wood camp on the Bratom road, six miles east of Salem yesterday afternoon destroyed more than 1,000 cords of wood, cut for the state hospital for the insane, located up the timber on a big acreage owned by Frank Smith, burned an unoccupied house and threatened the surrounding country. The wood at present prices would be worth \$5,000 it is estimated.

Mayor's Proclamation.

To the People of Medford:

The one great thought of the people of Medford should be the winning of the war. There is only one way to do this and that is to do everything in our power to assist our government and our boys who are over there. To do this we must practice economy in our everyday life. The one request from the government which we have not fulfilled is the purchasing of war saving stamps. In purchasing these stamps we must not consider it as a charitable act, or as an accommodation, or as a compulsory act, but as a pleasant privilege of showing our faith in our government and a duty to our boys over there.

Start Savings Account.

The government is only asking us to start a savings account with them for which they are willing to pay a high rate of interest. It is the best investment that we can make and at the same time we are helping to preserve the lives of those most dear to us who are fighting our battles. We who stay at home are the chair warming soldiers who are allowed to have all the comforts of home and the pleasure of remaining with our families and are not even discommoded physically by the war.
