PARIS, July 1.—French troops last night carried out an operation on the Marne front south of the Oureq, which resulted in the improvement of the French position in the vicinity of Passy-en-Valois.

LONDON, July 1.—British troops last night in a minor operation in the region northwest of Albert, effected an improvement in the British positions there and captured many guns and prisoners, the war office announced today.

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YANKEE OFFICERS CHASED BY AIRPLANE

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 30.—(By the Associated Press.) An American lieutenant-colonel and two other officers had a thrilling experience Friday night with a German airplane. The Americans were traveling along a road in an automobile when the enemy aviator fired on them with his machine gun.

The chauffeur increased his speed to the limit in an attempt to outrun the enemy airplane, while bullets rained all about the automobile. The lieutenant colonel found a way out of the ticklish situation by turning off the lights and stopping the automobile.

SENATORS TRY TO INCREASE PRICE OF WHEAT TO \$2.50

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Senators from wheat producing states today made another determined effort to increase the government's minimum guarantee of wheat to \$2.50 per bushel. Dismissing the resolution of Majority Leader Martin proposing that the senate yield to house objections to price increase, representatives of the wheat growing states declared that even with the new price increase provided recently by the food administration's grain corporation to meet increased freight charges the present guarantee is not sufficient to give farmers a fair profit or to stimulate production.

A compromise of \$2.25 per bushel was proposed by Senator Norris of Nebraska. He offered a substitute for the Martin resolution provided for the \$2.35 minimum based on number 2 wheat at principal interior markets.

That a direct vote might be taken upon the proposal to fix the price of wheat at \$2.50 a bushel, Senator Norris later withdrew his substitute. Senators Sterling of South Dakota, Gronna of North Dakota, Borah of Idaho, Curtis of Kansas and Reed of Missouri opposed the senate receding from its position. Senator Gronna said Food Administrator Hoover appearing before the senate agricultural committee opposed the fixing of a maximum price for wheat.

SACRIFICED HIMSELF TO SAVE HIS MEN

LONDON, June 19.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) Lieutenant Harry Thorne, on duty in France, was examining hand grenades in a concrete dugout when one of them began to fizzle. There were twelve men in the dugout and there was no possible means of disposing of the bomb. Lieutenant Thorne shouted to his men to clear out while he himself endeavored to smother the grenade by holding it pressed to his body. His efforts were futile and the bomb exploded, killing him. ISAACS LOCATED IN HUN PRISON CAMP

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Lieutenant Edward V. Isaacs, U. S. N., who was taken prisoner by the German submarine which sank the American transport President Lincoln, has been located in a prison camp in Germany. A telegram received by American Red Cross here from Switzerland announced that Lieutenant Isaacs was at Karlsruhe and well. The information was immediately forwarded to Lieutenant Isaacs' wife at Portsmouth, Va., but dispatches from that place said that she had left there for her summer home at Fort Huachuca, Ariz.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—A report from Vice Admiral Sims to Secretary Daniels today says a recent test in European water of a seaplane propelled by the Liberty motor, demonstrated that the engine has better climbing and load-carrying qualities than any of the best European types.

DOUBT CAST UPON CZAR'S ASSASSINATION

WASHINGTON, July 1.—State department dispatches from Stockholm say the German semi-official Wolff Zeitung has sent out a Frankfurter Zeitung dispatch from Darmstadt saying latest reports do not confirm the rumors of the murder of the former Czar Nicholas.

FOURTEEN DESTROYERS LAUNCHED JULY 4

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Fourteen destroyers will be launched from American yards on July 4.—These, with the number of Eagle boats, will represent the navy's share of tonnage to take the water in celebration of Independence Day.
