GAS COMPANY TO RAISE RATES

SALEM, Ore., July 2.—In an order today the public service commission granted temporarily an application of the Oregon Gas and Electric company to increase its rates. The order affects the company's business at Medford, Grant's Pass and Roseburg, all of which were represented at the hearing. The company paid the price that because of the advance cost of all it would have to go out of business unless relief could be obtained by increased rates on its products. The order provides that after a period of six months the authority given in the order shall cease and the former rates be restored unless further advances shall be granted by the commission. The old rates charged by the company ranged from \$1.20 per 1,000 cubic feet for 45,000 feet and over to \$1.75 for quantities up to 5,000 feet. New rates range from \$1.30 for an excess over 45,000 feet up to \$2.15 below 5,000 feet.

CALKINS HOLDS RECALLED KLAMATH JUDGE FOR TRIAL

Judge Calkins has overruled the demurrer to the complaint charging former County Judge Marion Hanks, the recalled county judge of Klamath county, and associates with illegally paying the sum of \$41,548, on the construction of the new courthouse building, in block 35, and given the defendant until July 15, to plead.

The action in question was instituted by Klamath county, through District Attorney W. M. Duncan, assisted by E. L. Elliott and Fred Mills, of Klamath Falls, and Jay Bowerman of Portland, on May 14. Contractor J. M. Dougan, now in charge of the construction of the new building; former County Judge Marion Hanks, Architect E. E. McClarren of Portland, County Commissioner Frank H. McCormack and County Clerk C. R. De Lap are made defendants in the action to recover the sum of \$41,548, alleged to have been illegally paid in county funds to apply on the construction price of the new courthouse, for which a contract was let by the old county court on April 20.

In substantiation that the defendants fraudulently caused the money to be paid from the county funds, the complaint in the action recites that the county court was not sitting as a body at the time the contract was given for the construction of the building, on April 20, and that there was no regular meeting of the court and no notice of a meeting given to County Commissioner Burrell Shrot when the money was ordered paid.

It is also alleged that E. E. McClarren, in preparing the certificates for the payment of this money, was aware of the fact that payments accordingly were not called for by the contract upon which they were to apply, and that County Clerk De Lap knew this to be a fact when he issued the warrants in question.

TIME TO SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH SAYS PATHOLOGIST

The first brood of codling moth is about over at this time. The first of the second brood will follow the last part of the first brood so closely that it is necessary to keep the fruit covered from now till picking time and in order to keep the fruit thoroughly covered it is necessary to spray every three or four weeks. Application should be made between the 1st and 10th of July followed by another during the last week of July or the first week in August. Appar-

ently there are more worms at this time than we had at this time last year and unless very thoro spraying is done from now on we will have more wormy fruit than we had last season.
