A simple device has been added to the acoustic properties of the big auditorium, and frequenters of the present assembly entertainments will be greatly pleased at this improvement. The forenoon of Friday were occupied by a factory series lecture, Bible and Junior Chataqua features, with a lecture in the afternoon by Joshua Stansfield on "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde." Friday evening's attention will be a rousing patriotic program by the Old Soldier Soldiers, to which the management writes all veterans, their wives and wives to attend the opening night of charge. Saturday afternoon's lecture will depict "The Meaning of the Great War" by Dr. J. C. Bushnell, and in the evening James D. Burns will lecture on "Remember the Maine Mountains." Sunday is an epoch making event, and this year will be no exception, with a great service at 11 a. m. with Dr. Stansfield, of the First M. E. church, Portland, as pulpit orator, he being well known as an intellectual giant. Sunday afternoon problems arising when a man marries will be dwelt upon by Dr. Merton's and Sunday evening the "Philosophy of Common Sense" will be a lecture theme by Dr. Cox.

With slight changes the program of the afternoon's events was carried out as outlined. The success of this initial gathering prompts a repetition of the picnic occasion as an annual event.

Kenneth McWilliams, accompanied by his wife, was a home visitor here the week, having come from Portland and demonstrating the merits of a fine new Columbia car which had been disposed of to local purchasers.

Mr. and Mrs. Irving Finley, Ashland residents temporarily stopping in Southern California, have lately received a notice of the death of Mr. Finley's brother, W. R. Cornell, gunner with the marines serving in France, who was desperately wounded in a recent engagement.

John Finmerman, of this city, is one of 22 University of Oregon students who have been designated to attend a special military training camp at San Francisco, for the next two months, after which he will return to the university and become assistant instructor in military science and tactics.

It replenished through patriotic fund channels by specific subscription Ashland's war chest, systematic-

tions either donated outright or by monthly installments, is meeting demands more than up to expectations. There originally were 1011 subscribers, their pledges and donations aggregating \$20,125. The plan as launched, began with June payments, which aggregated \$4,950, of which sum \$3,750 was diverted to the second Red Cross appeal. This left a balance in the treasury July 1, of \$1,165. The amount of delinquencies on the June schedule of pledges was only \$197, the most of these being classified as collectable. The Red Cross design in the holiday pageant was ideal, being symbolic of "The Greatest Mother in the World," as graphically depicted in the organizations posters during the recent campaign.

The Civic Improvement club will conduct tea and rest rooms in the Camp block during Chataqua. This will be in addition to Red Cross salvage headquarters already established there.

Copies of "The Sapper," a miniature newspaper issued by the 318th Engineers, have made their appearance here, having been sent home from France by J. M. Spencer, belonging to that regiment. This publication originally appeared at various camps in the country where the engineers were stationed before going abroad.

Mr. and Mrs. Phil Ross are here from Riverside, Cal., for a vacation stay with relatives. Next school year Prof. Ross will teach at Monterey.

Portland papers verify the report lately made that the Lindsay Bros. of this city, were arrested for unlawful enclosure of government land in the Crater national forest, the Dead Indian section being the location specified. The lands are alleged to have been enclosed with private lands near Lilyden and were used and rented for grazing.

There will be a patriotic hall at the Nat. in Medford, Friday evening, July 19, to which all drafted men, soldiers and sailors will be admitted free. Lumsden's Jazz orchestra will furnish music.

The Redebah lodges of this district will picnic in the parks on the afternoon and evening of Tuesday, July 30.

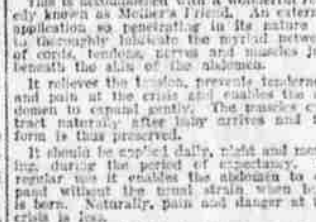
It developed that Charley Sheldon, who died in San Diego recently, met his death by being crushed by a falling log when workmen were erecting an army target.

Ordinance No. 939

AN ORDINANCE providing for the suppression of venereal diseases and declaring an emergency.

Section 1. Venereal Diseases Dangerous to Public Health. Syphilis, gonorrhoea and chancroid, hereinafter designated venereal diseases, are hereby recognized and declared to be contagious, infectious, communicable and dangerous to the public health.

Section 2. Venereal Diseases to Be Reported. It shall be the duty of every licensed physician, of every superintendent or manager of a hospital or dispensary, and of every person who gives treatment for a venereal disease, to mail to the Board of Health of the City of Medford, a card supplied by said Board, stating the age, sex, color, marital condition and occupation of such diseased person, the nature and previous duration of such disease and its probable origin; such card to be mailed within three days after the first examination of such diseased person, provided, that, except as hereinafter required, the name and address of such diseased person shall not be reported to the Board of Health.

Section 3. Persons Afflicted With Venereal Diseases to Be Given a Circular of Information. It shall be the duty of every licensed physician and of every other person who treats a person afflicted with venereal disease to give such person at the first examination a circular of information and advice concerning venereal diseases furnished by the Board of Health, and in addition to such diseased person a copy of this ordinance, and to report to the Board of Health that such diseased person has received the two documents herein specified.

Section 4. Change of Physician to Be Reported by Patient to Physician First Consulted. When a person applies to a physician or other person for treatment of a venereal disease, it shall be the duty of the physician or other person consulted to inquire of and ascertain from the person seeking treatment whether such person has been treated by any other physician or persons, and if so, to ascertain the name and address of the physician or person last consulted. It shall be the duty of the applicant for treatment to furnish this information and a refusal to do so, or falsely stating the name and address of such physician or person consulted shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance. It shall be the duty of the physician whom the applicant seeks to and does consult or employ to notify the physician last consulted or employed of the change of advisers, such notification to be made upon a form furnished for that purpose by the Board of Health.

Section 5. Spread of Venereal Disease Unlawful. It shall be unlawful for any person to inoculate any other person with any of the said venereal diseases, and it shall be unlawful for any person to perform or commit any act which exposes any other person to inoculation of or infection with any of the said diseases.

Section 6. Druggists to Keep Record of Sales of Drugs for Venereal Diseases. Any druggist or other person who sells any drug, compound, specific or preparation of any kind, used for or reasonably intended to be used for the cure of any of said venereal diseases shall keep a record of the name, address, and sex of the person making such purchase. A copy of said record shall be mailed each week to the City Health Officer.

Section 7. Order of Board of Health. It shall be unlawful for any person to neglect or refuse to obey any order of the Board of Health authorized by this ordinance or to interfere with or obstruct said board in the performance of its duties herein required.

Section 8. Violation. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not exceeding thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 9. Inasmuch as our country is engaged in a great war and the City of Medford is doing its utmost to carry out all war measures which will help our Government and it is of the utmost importance to the general welfare of said City and directly involves the honor of said City and the peace, health and safety of said City is directly involved, and it is essential that the provisions of this ordinance become effective without delay.

Section 10. NOW THEREFORE. By reason of the foregoing facts an emergency is hereby declared to exist and it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City that this ordinance take effect immediately and it shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.

Section 11. AN ORDINANCE directing the City Recorder in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 143 of the City Charter, to correct and transfer certain assessments upon the consolidated lien dockets of the City of Medford.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 143 of the City Charter, the City Recorder has ascertained and reported to the City Council any and all cases of assessments

already bonded and concerning which no application to extend payments has been filed, as in Sec. 142 of the City Charter provided, now therefore the

CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. That the City Recorder be and hereby is authorized and empowered and directed to correct upon the consolidated lien docket, all cases of unpaid assessments already bonded and concerning which no application to extend payments was filed as in Sec. 142 of the City Charter provided, so that there shall appear upon such consolidated lien docket as to such assessments only the delinquent installments and delinquent interest thereon and he shall transfer to the appropriate lien docket the installments of such assessments not due with interest at the rate chargeable to such assessments.

The City Recorder is further directed that in the event of any such installment or installments not now delinquent shall hereafter not be paid within the time fixed for such payment or payments, the amount of any such installment or installments with interest so becoming delinquent shall thereupon by him be entered upon the consolidated lien docket.

Section 2. Inasmuch as the reorganization of the finances of said City is now taking place and is of the utmost importance to the general welfare of said City and directly involves the credit of said City and the peace, health and safety of said City is directly involved and it is essential that the provision of this ordinance become effective without delay.

NOW THEREFORE. By reason of the foregoing facts an emergency is hereby declared to exist and it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage by the City Council and approved by the Mayor.
