Although heavily hammered, the Americans repelled in like along the river and the fighting shifted back and forth through Sergy, three miles southeast of Fere-En-Tardenois. Up to midday the Germans had been unable to force a recrossing of the Oureq.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE AISNE MARNE FRONT, July 29, 8:30 a. m.—(By the Associated Press.)—French and American troops were slashing vigorously at the stiffening German resistance, with indications that the advancing line would be close to the river Ardre which is now only a few kilometers away.

The German base at Fere-En-Tardenois has been occupied.

From Rheims the line now extends almost straight southwest to Olizy-El-Violaine, the west of Ris is now behind the allies and they are holding Champ-Voisly to the northeast of the forest. In this region the Germans have the higher ground and have some advantage in the artillery duel.

LONDON, July 29.—Major General John Biddle, commanding the American forces in the United Kingdom, has been appointed a Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath.

75,000 PEASANTS MARCH ON KIEFF

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Seventy-five thousand peasants are marching on Kieff, capital of Ukraine, according to information received at the state department today from Stockholm. They are protesting against the Russian government's policy of allowing the Ukrainian and surrounding country to be divided.

It also was said that the Russian and Ukrainian peace delegates have been unable to agree upon details of the settlement between the two nations.

The soviet government at Moscow also was reported in the advices to have expelled from the capital all relatives of the persons implicated in the murder of Count Von Mirbach, German ambassador at Moscow.

(Continued From Page One.) Allied losses have been kept at a minimum by the most extensive use of tanks. Casualty has again taken a hand in the pursuit and low flying airplanes have been harassing the retreating Germans unceasingly.

In its official statement Berlin makes no admission of allied advances either Saturday or Sunday.

Official denial is made from Field Marshal Von Hindenburg either is dead or in poor health. His health is reported to be excellent.

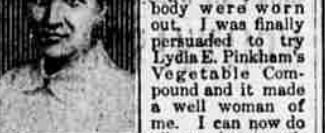
LONDON, July 29.—Two lines of German trenches on a two mile front astride the Bray-Corbie road, east of Amiens, have been captured by Australian troops, the war office announced today.

NOTICE TO BRITONS and CANADIANS IN THE UNITED STATES On July 31st the recruiting convention between Great Britain and the United States will come into force and the period for voluntary enlistment terminates on September 28th. During this period of sixty days, all Britons and Canadians between the ages of twenty and forty-four both inclusive, have an opportunity of offering their services to their own countries at a time when the services of every man are urgently needed. For sixty days the American draft and can enlist at any recruiting depot of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission regardless of the fact that they may have taken out first United States citizen papers or have been classified in class one. During this period of sixty days all Britons and Canadians of twenty years of age and those between the ages of twenty years of age and those between the ages of thirty-one and forty-four inclusive will be required to register on a date fixed by proclamation by the President and thirty days after registration, men of these ages will be liable to the American draft. On September 28th the period within which you can volunteer expires and thereafter you will be liable to draft into the United States Army.
