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TRAVEL TO CRATER LAKE INCREASING

Despite the general falling off of railroad tourist travel from the east to the Pacific coast, Crater lake up to August had been visited by 2157 more persons than up to the same time last year. The increase in auto travel to the lake this season greatly exceeds that of last summer, there having been up to August 1, 363 more autos at the lake than last year. August is expected to be a banner month in visitors to the lake. The Crater Lake travel figures up to August 1st, compiled by Will G. Steel, superintendent of Crater Lake National park, are as follows: Visitors 4568 as against 2411 for the same period last year; autos 823 as against 539 cars last year.

THE YELLOW DOG BUSY.

A YELLOW DOG—a dachshund, by the way, has played an important part in the Texas primary campaign which resulted in the defeat of former Governor James E. Ferguson, (who was impeached a year ago) by W. P. Hobby, who as lieutenant governor, became governor. On every billboard and at every cross roads appeared the yellow dachshund with "\$150,000?" branded across the body, while a million post cards carried the cur to the voter. One of the ten charges against Ferguson was that he received \$156,000 from unnamed sources, which he refused to divulge. His impeachment barred him from ever holding public office again in Texas, yet his influence with the democratic executive committee was sufficient to place his name on the official ticket in defiance of the constitution. He made a vigorous campaign, comparing himself to Christ as the victim of persecution by the "Texas University crowd."

When Ferguson was impeached, his loyalty was not questioned. Investigation however, indicates that the money received by Ferguson came from pro-German sources and that he played a paid part in the German propaganda as an agent of the Hun.

Three San Antonio brewers have been indicted on the charge that they spent \$100,000 for political influence and charged it to legitimate expense, defrauding the government of income tax and excess profits' war tax. This money, or part of it, it is charged, found its way to Ferguson, and in return, Ferguson while governor, opposed the war, and made a speech violently attacking the selective draft and wired Texas congressmen to oppose it. Two days after his speech, he deposited \$25,000 in an Austin bank and two days later \$30,000 in a Houston bank—quite a price for one speech.

Ferguson, when governor, attempted to dominate the university and vetoed its \$2,000,000 appropriation bill because the regents refused to dismiss the president and elect L. M. Keasbey, a member of the faculty, as his successor. Keasbey proved to be a graduate from the Kaiser Wilhelm university at Strassburg, receiving the "royal purple" degree conferred personally by the kaiser and carrying the title "Master of the German Viewpoint." As personal representative of the kaiser it became his duty to spread Kultur over the earth. Only three others in the United States hold this degree.

Keasbey wrote Ferguson's platform and many of his speeches in 1914 in return for which Keasbey was to be made president of the university. When Ferguson was impeached, he was dismissed from the university faculty because of a disloyal speech at Chicago, and became editor of Vierick's "International Monthly," a publication financed by the German propaganda, whose publisher admits receiving money from Bernstorff and who is now under investigation by the department of justice.

GERMANS CRINGE WITH FEAR AS BOMB NEARS SUB

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Sensations experienced in a German Submarine while depth bombs were being discharged overhead were described recently by a British merchant ship captain who was a prisoner for 15 days aboard a U-boat. In an interview the English commander, captured by the Germans after his vessel had been torpedoed, related how the depth bombs shook the under sea craft and created consternation among the sailors. In one instance the faces of the Germans became white with fear and all stood trembling after the first shot, which was not near enough to destroy the submersible. All were expecting a second discharge.

The English commander reached his native land after having been imprisoned for months at Brandeburg, he said, he and other ship officers at times had been harassed to such a degree that they were unable to sleep. "The effect on the crew was evident. U-boat Sinks 7 Vessels: Seven vessels were torpedoed by the Germans while the British captain was aboard the U-boat. Previously the English officer had been in command of a merchant vessel which had also met its fate at the hands of a submarine crew. "On the third day after I had been taken prisoner," said the captain, "just after the midday meal, I gathered that the submarine was about to carry out an attack on a convoy which had just been sighted. The U-boat approached submerged for some distance and torpedoed a large steamer. Our whereabouts apparently were detected, I was told, by an allied light cruiser, for we dived rapidly to a great depth. "Hardly had the submarine reached an even keel when we heard and felt a tremendous explosion which caused the U-boat to vibrate from stem to stern. It was a depth charge from the cruiser. The one big event which has established candy as a food is this tremendous war. This war has put everything to the acid test and only that which is fit survives. For instance, there was a time when rum and whiskey were thought to supply the ideal bodily fuel. But today the acid test of war has proven beyond a doubt that alcohol is a thing of the past as a food product. The British army reports that its soldiers in France have required five times the amount of candy that was expected.
