ASHLAND AND VICINITY

Third and war savings stamp sales through the Ashland postoffice and its various channels aggregated \$15,000 in July, as compared with \$18,638 in June. Total sales to Aug. 1, \$33,500. It should be borne in mind that banks and other agencies are supplied through postoffice sources. Since sales were inaugurated in December, 1917, June has proved to be the bumper month thus far in stamp investments. A summary of war savings pledges in the school districts of Jackson reveals the figures: The Ashland district with a quota of \$53,650, gave pledges in the sum of \$64,908, being \$11,252 over the quota. Bellevue \$3,500, Pinehurst, \$215, Valleyview, \$1,000, Siskiyou, \$1,600, Soda Springs, \$1,670, and Celestine \$305, are all over their respective quotas, whereas Neil creek is 40 per cent behind its quota and Lithia Springs 39 per cent in the tardy classification. Four districts in Jackson made no response whatever to the stamp appeal.

It is conceded here that the Ashland soldier boys, who have been expected to pass through here, have gone east via Spangley. About 30 men were included in the list eligible for service in Europe, all the names of whom are not yet available. Glenn Simpson is among the number. His assignment is with the anti-aircraft gun squad, the personnel of which is equipped with motorcycles. They are advanced couriers of a general engineering and search the lines at random on the lookout for hostile airplanes.

The "Sugarbowl" is Ellis building, conducted by the Silliman Bros. with branch establishments at Medford and Grants Pass, has gone out of business locally. Reason assigned is a scarcity of sugar for the Ashland hotel. Why not flourize in the confectionary business on a 50-50 glucose basis.

Mexicans are more numerous than ever on the section gangs of the Shasta division. They receive \$2.75 per day on a uniform scale, whereas Greeks and Italians have been getting from \$2.75 to \$3 per day, according to specific units of territory. The Greeks and Italians on account of higher wages, have been flocking to the lumber camps.
