YANKS TURN CRISIS IN FAVOR OF ALLIES

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Field Marshal Haig, commander-in-chief of the British forces in France, in his fourth of August message on the occasion of the anniversary of the entry of Great Britain into the war, says to his troops:

"The conclusion of the fourth year marks the passing of the period of crisis. The Russian revolution set free large hostile forces which were transferred to the western front. The enemy intention was to use the great numbers and to gain a decisive victory before the arrival of American troops could give superiority to the allies. The enemy has failed. The steady stream of Americans arriving in France has restored the balance."

MEDFORD'S WATER SUPPLY IS PURE

The Medford water supply continues to be pure as is shown by the report of State Health Officer Holt which has just been received by City Water Superintendent Arnspleer. This report reads as follows:

"The examination of the sample of water submitted by you July 29th showed a bacterial count of 100 per C. C., neither gas nor colon bacilli having been recovered upon 72 hours incubation."

The bacterial count of 100 per C. C. refers to harmless germs such as exist in all water, and the inability to find either gas or colon bacilli after 72 hours incubation means that there is no sewerage contamination whatever in the water supply.

JOHN RYAN ASSURED OF LUMBER SUPPLIES

BUTTE, Aug. 2.—John D. Ryan, head of aircraft spruce production passed thru Butte early this afternoon over the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad on his way to Washington from the Pacific coast where he had been inspecting spruce companies and mills. He said that he was returning to the national capital with the full assurance that all the lumber required for the national aircraft program would be forthcoming.

AMBULANCE ORGANIZER DIES IN FRANCE

PARIS, Aug. 3.—Prof. Richard Norton, educator and organizer and head of the American volunteer motor ambulance corps which served on the French front from 1914 until it was taken over by the American army in September, 1917, died yesterday of meningitis after an illness of one day.

BEAN GROWERS TO FORM ASSOCIATION

All the bean growers of the Evans creek and Applegate sections except one who is going out of business, favor the formation of a bean growers association, according to County Agricultural Agent Cate who has just completed a survey in those districts, and a meeting will be held in the near future to organize. The new

association will endeavor to sell beans to the government by the car load.

Mr. Cate announces that the Jackson county beans are looking fine and that there will be a good sized crop despite the inroads made by the disease known as bean mosaic, which seems to have affected the bean crops all over the coast country this year.
