HUNS ABANDON OFFENSIVE.

serious if the French can advance north of the Aisne.

This would also threaten seriously the enemy positions in the salient about Montdidier and in Picardy and probably accounts for the withdrawals north and south of the Somme.

British troops now hold Hamel and Dernancourt on the west bank of the Ancre. Albert, where the Ancre divides the town, the situation is not clear.

From Mesnil—St. Georges, west of Montdidier to Braches, the Germans are retiring across the Avre. Their retrograde movement already has averaged two miles on a seven mile front. The French hold Braches, and are on the outskirts of Courtemarche.

Huns Abandon Drive

The allies now control the heights west of the Ancre and Avre rivers. Military experts have called the Avre the path to Amiens and the enemy positions on the west bank were very important, if the drive for Amiens was to be continued.

Great quantities of ammunition and guns have been taken by the French. American and British troops south of the Vesle.

TEN SIBERIAN TOWNS LIBERATED BY BOHEMIANS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Consolidation of the political factions in Siberia opposed to the Soviet government and the liberation of ten additional Siberian cities from the Bolsheviks through the combined efforts of the Czech-Slovaks and the military organizations of the Siberian government were announced in dispatches received today by the Russian embassy from Omsk.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The semi-official Russian newspapers, Pravda and Izvestia, declare that Siberia intends formally to declare war on the soviet government within a few days, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 5.—A plot to assassinate M. Lenin, the Bolshevik premier of Russia, and Leon Trotsky, the minister of war and marine, has been discovered, according to a Moscow telegram printed by the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin. Both of these officials have therefore doubled their precautionary measures.

CAULIFLOWER THEFT SCANDALIZES BERLIN

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 5.—Berlin, says the Lokalanzeiger, has been scandalized by the action of the city's burgomaster and his assistants in hiding cauliflowers, which they took home in defiance of the rationing order.

NEWSPAPERS MUST CUT DOWN EDITIONS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Paper mills have been listed as an essential industry, the priorities division of the war industries board announced on the understanding that the greatest possible economy will be exercised in the use of paper and that newspapers will reduce their consumption of news print 15 per cent on daily editions and 20 per cent on Sunday editions.

Publishers believe, it was said today, that discontinuance of many wasteful practices and institution of a sliding scale of reading matter will accomplish the required curtailments without interference with the advertising columns.

The war industries board is said to favor the principle that no new newspapers be started during the war.

RAIDING OPERATIONS ON FLANDERS FRONT

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Raiding operations were carried out last night by the British near Neuville-Vitase, in which prisoners were taken, the war office announces today.

On the northern front opposite La Bassée, the German guns have been very active. They have shown some activity also north of Bethune and between Hazebrouck and Ypres.

HOGS BRING HIGHEST PRICE BREAKING ALL RECORDS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Hogs in the livestock market here today jumped 55 cents per hundred to \$19.15, the highest liveweight price on record.

NEBRASKA CORN CROP THREATENED BY DROUGHT

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 5.—Intense heat and lack of moisture are seriously threatening the success of the corn crop in Nebraska crop experts stated here today. In many sections of the state serious damage has already been done, it was stated.
