U. S. FLEET UNDER BRITISH COMMANDER

LONDON, Aug. 7.—Admiral Sims has announced that most of the U. S. destroyers have been serving under a British vice admiral since May, 1917, and that U. S. dreadnaughts are acting as part of the British grand fleet under Admiral Sir David Beatty. They have adopted British signals and practices as a result of the unity in command. American ships are serving from the White Sea to the Adriatic, he said.

JAP STEAMER SUNK BY U-BOAT OFF NOVA SCOTIA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The Diamond Shoals lightship, off Cape Hatteras, N. C., was shelled and sunk by an enemy submarine late yesterday, the navy department was today informed. The crew has reached shore safely.

The submarine came within a half mile of shore, according to the brief report which reached the navy department.

A CANADIAN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 7.—An American schooner arrived here today with 85 members of the crew of a Japanese freight steamship which had been torpedoed off the Nova Scotia coast.

The vessel was the Tokuyama Maru, 7,629 tons gross. She was sunk without warning about 200 miles off shore on August 1, according to the crew.

HAMILL INJURED IN ORCHARD ACCIDENT

P. W. Hamill, the well known orchardist, had a narrow escape from serious injury and death Tuesday, and fortunately got away with bad bruises and cuts.

Mr. Hamill was driving a flat top wagon through the orchard, loaded with empty boxes, on top of which were seated his two children. Some of the boxes slid forward and fell on the horses, which frightened the animals and they started to run away. Then the wagon tipped slightly throwing more boxes and the children off to one side, and precipitating Mr. Hamill forward between the horses. He was dragged for a distance before the horses were stopped.

The children escaped injury, but Mr. Hamill was badly bruised about the body, sustained a cut over the right eye where one of the horses kicked him, several minor cuts about the face, and in addition a wagon wheel passed over one of his legs, no bones of which were broken.

GERMANY BECOMES ANIMAL-LESS LAND

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 7.—Germany is rapidly becoming an animal-less land. Nearly all the cats and dogs have been killed, there is no more poultry, and the few cows left get so little food that they have to be slaughtered. Horses receive at most a couple of "sounds of oats and five pounds of hay a day.

CONTROL OF AIR IN ALLIED HANDS

BRITISH AIR FORCE HEAD-QUARTERS IN FRANCE, Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press.) There have been many signs recently of extreme uneasiness by the German high command regarding the increasing ascendancy of the allied airmen on the western front. This has been especially evident since the American airmen have begun to appear in force and have proved themselves of the same mettle as the French and British fliers.

It has become a common-places among British airmen that their opponents will not face combat in the air unless in strength of three or four to one, and German prisoners have told of German airmen being punished by their flight commanders for returning to their airplanes still laden with bombs and ammunition which they had been ordered to drop over the British lines. It is becoming increasingly hard to find a German airman over the allied side of the lines in the daytime, as is proved by the German's own admission that when they do manage to bring down an allied machine it is almost always over their own territory.
