

ORTHWEST TO  
TIGHT INCREASED  
RAILROAD RATES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Public service commissions of Washington, Oregon and Idaho, today filed complaints with the Interstate Commerce Commission against the 25 per cent increase in freight rates and the 10 per cent increase in express rates on apples, berries and fish shipped from the northwest. The rates are declared to be discriminatory and unauthorized under law by which the government assumed control of the utilities. The commission is asked to set aside the rates and established new rates not higher than formerly prevailed. These complaints, it was said, are the first important ones opposing the new rates. Director General Adoo and 26 railroads are named as defendants in the freight rate case and that attacking the express rates are the American railway express company, the express combine established under governmental auspices, which were filed by the commissions on behalf of several fruit growing associations in the northwest. The increases on a per cent basis, it is contended, give fruit and vegetable growers in the middle west an advantage over the northern growers and disturbs the relationship that had existed between competing points. This advantage it is alleged, will destroy the industries of the northwest. Increases, it is charged, were not needed by the carriers or express companies.

BRAZILIAN SUGAR  
VESSEL ASHORE

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 13.—A Brazilian freight steamer ran ashore on the New England coast during a heavy fog today. The tide was receding at the time and observers believed the vessel to be in a dangerous position. One report was that the steamer was evading a German submarine. A later report was that the steamer, which was loaded with sugar, had lost her way in a fog. Coast guardsmen declined to say how the captain explained being so far off his course. The vessel was aground on a lying bottom. The steamer, formerly of German registry, was taken over by the Brazilian government when that country entered the war.

WOMEN'S PARTY AGAIN  
RIOT AT WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Another women's party demonstration in protest against the senate's delay in acting on the federal suffrage amendment was broken up Monday by the police. Thirty-eight women participating, banner-carriers and speakers, were arrested as they assembled before the Lafayette statue in the square opposite the White House.

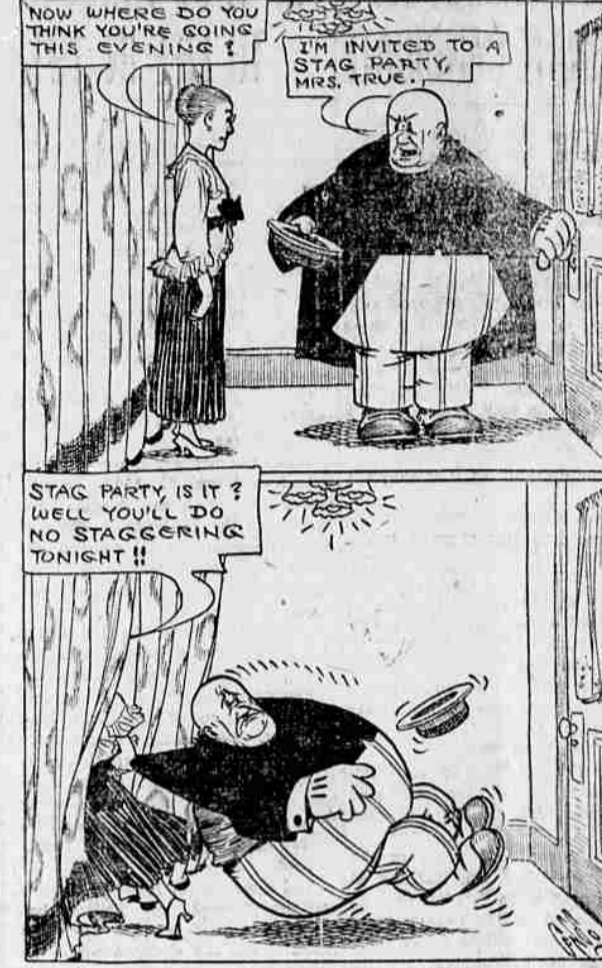
