LONDON, Aug. 15.—No class one division has been demitted of more men for army service than the government departments. There are now more than 60,000 employed from these departments in active service.

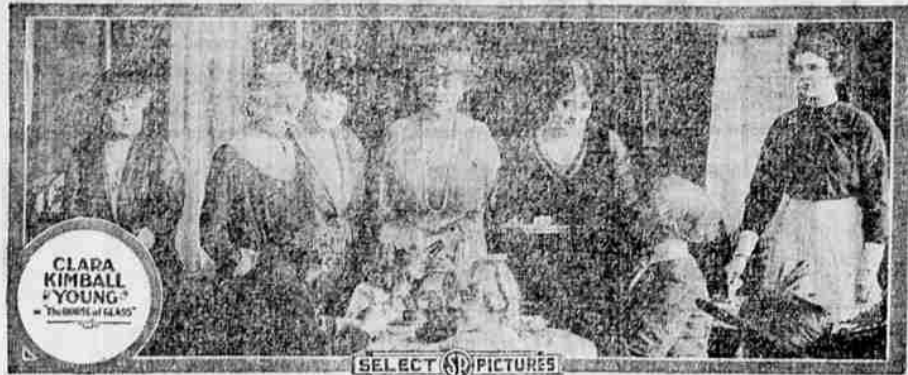

DEALERS SUGAR CARDS DISTRIBUTED

Notice to the Public: The dealers' sugar cards have been distributed thruout Jackson county today. No dealer is allowed to sell any sugar except to customers signing the card. The administration has avoided taking this step until it was made absolutely necessary. We must all co-operate to allow a meager supply to our allies and a reasonable amount for consumption at home until the next crop. The cards give all information necessary. Two pounds will be allowed as a maximum per person per month. Special permits will be issued for a reasonable amount for canning purposes by application to the county administrator giving number in the family. W. A. FOLGER, County Administrator.

ASK FINANCIAL AID FOR CATTLE-GROWERS

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—An appeal to Secretary McAdoo for government aid in financing cattle raising was telegraphed today by W. B. Tagg, president of the National Livestock Exchange.

Mr. Tagg states that cattlemen for the most part can get only six months loans and asks an appropriation by congress from which 12 months loans can be made. Unless this is done, he says, herds will decrease in the next two years. He explains that unusual climate and financial conditions are curtailing the buying of light stock for feeding, and affecting breeding herds.

## LULL IN BATTLE MARKED BY HUN WITHDRAWALS

(Continued From Page One.)

French have captured all the high ground on the Lassigny massif and are working down the north and eastern sides so that a further retirement of the enemy in that sector is probable, according to advices received here this afternoon.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Both sides are gathering strength for a resumption of heavy fighting. That, however, does not prevent the French from hammering away at the Lassigny and doggedly struggling onward through gas-choked woods.

General Humbert's men have carried Ribecourt, which barred the road running toward Noron between Thiescourt ridge and the Oise. The enemy in the Thiescourt position is reported to be showing signs of giving way.

Struggle at Standstill WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 15.—(Reuters, 2 p. m.) Along the new battlefront from Gury to Thiescourt wood the struggle came to a standstill today. In addition to the St. Claude and Escouville farms, we hold ground to the north of Belval village and a footing in Pleasier-De-Roye park. The battle, therefore, has reached a natural conclusion and the danger of a counter-attack from Thiescourt Massif has been removed.

The British patrols were active throughout last night in the district between Albert and Ailette, where the Germans began their retirement yesterday. The patrols have maintained close touch with the enemy in this region.

The British made further progress at several points on this front.

Since August 8 when the allied attack in Pleadry began the British and French have taken prisoners to the number of 20,344.

Violent Artillery Duel PARIS, Aug. 15.—The violent artillery duel between the Avre and the Oise continued last night, according to the statement from the war office today. A German raid in Champagne failed.

The statement reads: "The night was marked by the rather intense activity of the artillery between the Avre and the Oise."

"An enemy raid in Champagne against the Marquis sector was without result."

MANCHESTER, Mass., Aug. 15.—President and Mrs. Wilson arrived here today for a visit at the summer home of Colonel E. M. House. Their special train made the trip from Washington in approximately 12 hours, arriving here at 9:20 o'clock this morning. Escaping by a few hours some of the hottest weather of the summer, the president found the north shore delightfully cool and clear.

The president and Mrs. Wilson were met at the station by Colonel

House and Mrs. House and a few other friends. It was understood that it was the wish of the president that he be permitted to enjoy the brief outing quietly and so far as known here no visitors were expected.

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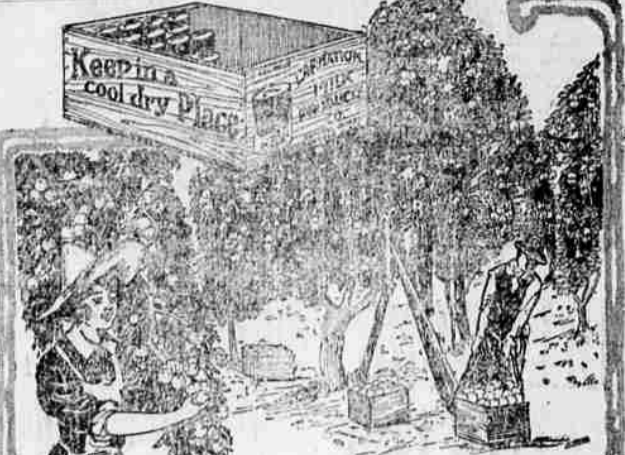
