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FRENCH ADVANCE FOUR MILES

close to the important town of Lascruy.

The German's hold on Roye also seems to be weakened by the recent progress of the French north and south of the town. It would appear that Roye now is enveloped on three sides.

Just northwest of Soissons the French have occupied Vassens, which is on the eastward bank of a small stream which flows into the Oise river at Morsain, which was captured by the French yesterday.

In the old Picardy battlefield the Germans have been launching repeated counter attacks against the British line southeast of Chilly. These assaults were repulsed by the British.

The old Lys salient is being rapidly flattened out by the German retirement from the extreme westerly positions held by them after their April offensive. The British official statement shows that the line now runs from Meriville, on the north, to the vicinity of Locon on the south, leaving a large triangle of abandoned territory in the direction of St. Venant which has been occupied by the British.

Noyon fast is becoming the central point of a salient such as that created around Montdidier at the beginning of the Picardy offensive.

Liessing is being approached from the south by General Humbert's troops who have finally debouched from Thiepval wood.

General Mangin has captured more high ground and has taken Morsain and has brought his total of prisoners to 2,200.

If Marshal Foch can succeed in pinching off Noyon and advancing northward he will compel the Germans to retire from the present line north of Roye toward Arras and will hasten, if not force, a German retreat to the north of the Aisne between Soissons and Rheims.

There has been only slight activity along the Vesle, the French and Americans having enlarged their holding north of the river by slight advances at several points.

Mr. Stripp, who is first lieutenant of Company F, state militia, the Medford company, will retain his commission in that service for some time yet before resigning, and if the company is merged into the federal service, as is now contemplated, he will return and go with the command into that service.

ENLISTING MEN FOR SHIPYARD WORK AT ASTORIA

At the federal employment agency in the Nash hotel building six men enlisted yesterday to take employment as helpers in the shipbuilding yards at Portland and Astoria. There were many other applicants and the outlook is that from 15 to 20 men will be sent out by the government on a special coach attached to the regular passenger train Wednesday evening. Only helpers are being enlisted now, and not skilled mechanics. Nor are men enlisted who are needed in farm industry.

The enlistment of applicants will be continued all day today up to 9 p. m., and all day Wednesday. Of the six who enlisted yesterday for a period of six months only one was from Medford. The six were George H. Spencer of Madison, Wis., T. J. Atkinson of San Diego, J. J. Baker of Medford, C. J. Pabitt of North Bend, Ore., T. W. Hill of Ashland, and one other whose name is withheld for the present.

R. R. Howard, special representative of the Astoria Marine Iron Works at Astoria, Ore., arrived in Medford this morning to assist in enrolling at the federal employment agency, of skilled mechanics for the installation of machinery in government wood ships. The Astoria Marine Iron Works is charged with the final fitting up of all the government wood ships for seven different yards in the lower Columbia river district, and it is the hope to enroll a number of skilled mechanics from non-essential industries.

An all day meeting will be held at the Agate school house next Sunday with good speaking and special music. The public is invited to come with well filled lunch baskets.

KLAMATH COUNTY COURT HOUSE FIGHT BEFORE CALKINS

Another important legal chapter in the two courthouses muddle of long standing in Klamath county is being enacted in Jacksonville today with a number of citizens in attendance from Klamath Falls representing both sides of the controversy. The court end of the controversy has been on for some time before Judge F. M. Calkins of this county, as because of the heat of the muddle in Klamath county every citizen there is intensely interested and prejudiced in favor of one side or the other, and it would be almost impossible to obtain an unbiased jury.

Some time ago suit was brought against J. M. Dougan of Portland, contractor of the newest new court house, Former County Judge Marian Hanks, who was recalled because of letting the contract and other defendants, by the present county court, who plans completing the court house partially completed three years ago, to recover \$41,000 that Dougan collected as part of his remuneration for building the last new court house, on the grounds that he held no legal contract. Before Judge Calkins at Jacksonville today a motion was argued to have the answer of Dougan and the other defendants, who include Architect E. E. McClaren of Portland, stricken out.

The attorneys representing the plaintiffs are W. S. Wiley, C. L. Elliott, Fred H. Mills and W. M. Dunagan of Klamath Falls. The attorneys for the defendants are Harrison Allen of Portland, personal attorney of Contractor Dougan, and Thomas F. Drake and Chas. F. Stone of Klamath Falls. Among others interested from Klamath Falls here today who are interested in the case are Former County Judge Hanks, County Clerk C.
