PLEAD GUILTY TO VAGRANCY; FINED \$25

Chief of Police Timothy who has suspected for a week or more that something was wrong at a house on Pennsylvania street, and had had it under surveillance, decided Saturday afternoon that the time was ripe for a raid, and at 4 o'clock made an unexpected and unwelcome call. As a result he placed under arrest a 17-year-old girl who has been on parole from a state institution, a married woman from Central Point, and Albert Painter and R. S. Hesselgrave of Central Point.

The men were taken before Judge Taylor where they pleaded guilty to a charge of vagrancy and each was fined \$25 and costs, which they paid. The women were taken before County Prosecutor Roberts, who gave them a severe lecturing and notified them to appear at his office again today, when further steps may be taken in way of punishment.

LOSE POINTS HELD TWO YEARS

Heavy rain is falling over the battle area.

Between the Oise and the Aisne General Mangin is pressing steadily toward the western extremity of the Chemin Des Dames. Unconfirmed reports have been received in the American lines along the Vesle, that the enemy is withdrawing north of that river toward the Aisne.

Since last Wednesday the Germans have been driven eastward an average of more than four miles on the 30 mile front. The greatest allied gain has been six miles toward Bapaume, one of the most important points in the salient.

Secure High Ground On most of the front the British have pushed the Germans from the high ground so necessary for defense. Also the enemy has been forced out of much of the "crater country" marking the old Somme battlefield of 1916. This has opened up new opportunities for the tanks and cavalry. Allied airplanes continuously bomb troop concentrations and strategic centers behind the German lines.

If the enemy has counted on gaining the Hindenburg line and there finding secure positions from which to beat off an allied attack, his plans may be upset by the rapidity with

which the British have progressed toward Bullecourt. Once inside the Hindenburg defenses around Bullecourt the British have a good path toward Cambrai.

Fortunes Decided Premier Clemenceau says the fortunes of the war have been definitely decided owing to the victories of the last six weeks. The Austro-Hungarian soldiers have been taken prisoner by the allies at two different points on the main battle line, but there are no indications that Austrian aid for the battered German divisions is in great force.

Comparatively heavy fighting is taking place in Albania. Vienna says that Austrian troops have crossed the Semeni near the Adriatic and claims successes also in the center and on the enemy left. Rome reports the repulse of Austrian attacks against advance posts along the Semeni.

voting against it were Senators Brandegee, Frelinghuysen, Kellogg, Lodge, McCumber, Nelson, Smoot, Townsend, Wadsworth, Warren and Weeks, republicans, and Thomas, democrat.

The amendment caused considerable discussion. Senator Smoot objected that no educational plan had been worked out and no cost estimate given. Senator Borah replied that it was not a question of dollars and cents; that the government could not make a better investment and that the boys were entitled to the education because they would be fighting when they otherwise would be in school.

When debate began on the work or fight amendment written into the bill by the committee, Senator Cummins of Iowa, offered a proviso that the amendment should not be operative where strikers agree to abide by decisions of the war labor board.

Another committee amendment adopted provides that men under 21 shall not be denied commissions or entrance to officers training camps because of their youth.

Hindenburg line as it stood prior to the German drive on March 21. In this sector the Germans drove ahead slightly, but were held up after the second day of the fighting and after that time could not get further than Arras.

This morning's attack apparently was between the Cojeul river and the Scarpe and adds about four miles to the length of the battle front.

Fighting is reported proceeding at Henin.

The line of battle, starting with Fampoux on the Scarpe river, follows:

Nonchy - Le - Preux, Guenayve, Wancourt, Henin, Croiselles, east of Morey, Favreuil, Avesnes, Eaucourt L'Abbaye, Martimpuich, west of Baz-

entin-Le-Pit, Mametz and Carnoy to the west of Maricourt. There is and then proceeds to the Somme just little change south of the Somme.
