NARROW ESCAPE FOR AGED RANCHER WHEN GUN GOES OFF

J. M. Samuels, 70 years old, well known rancher residing one mile northeast of Central Point, and father of City Treasurer Gus Samuels of Medford, had a narrow escape from blowing off his head in a shot gun accident last Tuesday noon. As it was the right side of his face was badly lacerated by the contents of one barrel, but fortunately no shot entered his eyes, though they are badly swollen and full of powder.

Mr. Samuels was just about to start to visit a neighbor and decided to take his gun along to possibly shoot a rabbit on the way. He was talking on the porch with his wife and daughter, Mrs. C. J. Greer of Astoria, who was their guest, when he sat the old fashioned muzzle loading gun down on the porch too hard. Instantly one barrel discharged, the contents striking his right cheek bone and plowing along the right side of his head and entering the porch ceiling.

Besides the lacerations his face and eyes were badly powder burned, but it is thought his eyes were not permanently damaged. The whiskers and the hair on that side of his head were blown or burned off and the powder also set fire to his straw hat. Dr. R. W. Poellnitz was quickly summoned by telephone from Central Point and was soon on the scene. It is not thought that Mr. Samuels suffered any permanent injury. He is resting easy at his home.
