

GOMPERS COMING IMPORTANT EVENT SAYS LONDON POST

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The arrival in England of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor is an event of considerable importance, the Morning Post says.

"The name of Gompers," it adds, "is one to conjure with in the United States. There is keen rivalry between different sections of our own labor organizations and between the British and French for the honor of, shall we say, bringing Gompers out. But it is certain that he and his colleagues will attend the trades conference at Derby next week at which the question of war aims will be raised. Up to this time all attempts to lay down a definite policy for the allied labor movements have failed because American labor was not included.

"No international socialist movement exclusive of or antagonistic to American organized labor, can hope to prevail and Mr. Gompers may be the destined instrument of not the least service America has rendered the allied cause.

"He arrives at a decidedly good moment for the peace by negotiation internationalists have, like the Germans, overreached themselves and are on the run."
