MEN UP TO 46 YEARS OF AGE TO REGISTER ON 12TH

There has been much speculation and not a few warm disputes in the city relative to whether men who are over 45 years old and not yet 46, must register September 12th next. The point of dispute was over the interpretation of the official proclamation which reads as follows: "On that day every man in the United States and its possessions between the ages of 18 and 45 years inclusive, who has not already registered, or who is not already in the military or naval service, must register."

No two attorneys in the city were agreed in their interpretation of this clause of the proclamation. The main issue was over the meaning of the word "inclusive."

To settle this question the Mail Tribune got in touch with the draft board this forenoon. The board's official orders from the provost marshal general, read that all when who have not attained their 46th year must register on September 12th, without any exceptions whatsoever.

S. Bullis to at once make repairs on the paving at the intersection of Main street and the Bullis railroad.

TO BAN MARRIAGE OF HUN WIDOWS

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press). Enactment of a law in Germany to prevent widows from remarrying so as to leave the few available men for single women is urged in a letter to the Tay by a Munich doctor, Hans von Hertig. He points out that the widows, thru remarrying after the war would have a detrimental effect on the birth rate.

"On December 1, 1919," he writes, "there were in Germany about 399,000 widows between the ages of 18 and 45. At a very modest estimate there are now 500,000."

WISCONSIN PRIMARY RESULT IN DOUBT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 4.—The result of the republican gubernatorial primary election was still in doubt this morning. Governor E. L. Philipp and Roy P. Wilcox of Eau Claire running an even race. Tittlemore is a poor third.

Philipp's primary vote as far as heard from, is much lighter than two years ago.

In the congressional nomination contests Congressman Cooper, republican, appears to be running behind C. E. Randall, loyalty candidate; J. G. Monahan, republican, seems to have won over Congressman Nelson in the third and Congressman Carey, republican, is running a close race with John C. Kleczka.
