Mrs. Vera Hicks Deal and children have returned home to Klamath Falls after a visit here with relatives.

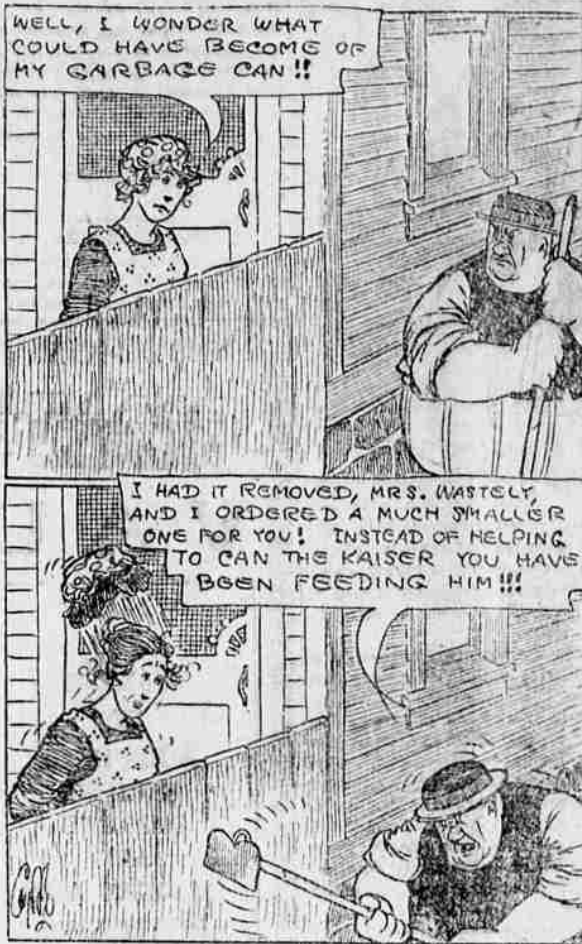
