

IMPORTANT REGISTRATION INFORMATION

The Local Registration Board Advises Registrants in Medford and Jackson County Where to Go to Register and Gives List of Names of Registrars.

The date set for registration of all persons from 18 to 45 years has been set for September 12, the hour for such registration is from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. You are to include all persons who have reached their 18th birthday and have not yet reached their 46th birthday. You are permitted to register any male person between these ages that may appear before you, up to and including September 12, 1918. This necessitates that a chief registrar be appointed on the board. You have been designated as chief registrar for _____ precinct and we are forwarding with other supplies some additional blank forms for the purpose of swearing in registrars in case you should require some one to assist you in your work in the 12th. We are leaving this matter to you to be decided upon, as the work comes to you on registration day. Generally a person would rather work through the day than to have more help than is needed and be unemployed most of the time.

Supplies Are Here

Your supplies are all being sent y r under separate cover and should reach you soon. We are inclosing herewith registration regulation No. 3, which you may study over to your advantage before you have to take up the matter of registration. You will note after reading the regulations that this board is required to re by telegraph to the adjutant general as to the number of registrants. It will in turn telegraph the number of registrants throughout the state to the provost marshal general. Therefore, as soon as you have your summary made up kindly telephone the local board at Jacksonvills as to the total number of registrants as soon as the registration has been completed. Then the cards together with the summary, etc., should be forwarded to the local board.

Require Prompt Returns

In view of the fact that this report on registration is ordered by the war department as soon as possible, so you will kindly make it your duty to see that returns are made to the board promptly.

If the local board can be of any service to you at any time, call up by telephone.
