STORIES OF WAR INTERESTINGLY TOLD BY DR. LOVEJOY

Inspiring, intellectual, patriotic and instructive was the address of Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy of Portland at the Rialto theater last night, which opened the liberty bond campaign in Medford. From the moment Dr. Lovejoy stepped on the stage in her Red Cross officer's uniform with the Chairman O. C. Rogers and before she had uttered a word the large audience of the women, children and young girls in the districts captured by the Germans was vividly portrayed.

Atrocities Authenticated

In speaking of the atrocities of the part of the German soldiers, Dr. Lovejoy said in part: "Whenever you hear of any atrocity, no matter how bad or shocking, believe it. While I did not personally see any atrocities, I heard of many from unquestioned authoritative sources, and witnessed so much corroborative evidence. Yes, just believe anything you hear about atrocities as the cutting off of children's hands is no doubt in each instance the work of perverted individual soldiers, but let me tell you that atrocities like the deporting and enslaving of all girls of 10 and over is the work of the German government."

High tribute to the American soldiers in France was paid by the speaker. "I saw and admired the allied soldiers over here," she said. "The British soldiers are fine, the French soldiers, well they are wonderful, but the American soldiers, oh, so big and strong and strong—the American soldiers, they are so splendid."
