BRITISH TAKE 75,000 BOCHE IN FEW WEEKS

"We Have Passed Through Many Dark Days, Please God They Will Never Return—The Enemy Has Now Spent His Effort" Says Marshal Haig in Order of Day to Troops

LONDON, Sept. 10.—The capture by the British of 75,000 prisoners and 750 guns in four weeks is announced by Field Marshal Haig in an order of the day. "We have passed through many dark days. Please God these will never return. The enemy has now spent his effort."

Text or Order The text of the field marshal's order of the day reads: "One month has now passed since the British armies have successfully withstood all the attacks of the enemy once more took the offensive in their turn. In that short space of time by a series of brilliant and skillfully executed actions, we have repeatedly defeated the same German armies whose vast superiority numbers compelled our retreat last spring. What has happened on the British front has happened also on the front of our allies."

Less than six months after the launching of the great German offensive which was to have cut the allied front in two, the allied armies everywhere today are advancing victoriously side by side over the same battlefields on which by the courage and steadfastness of their defense they broke the enemy's assaults.

Yet more has been done. Already we have passed beyond our old battle lines of 1917 and have made a wide breach in the enemy's strongest defenses.

WILLAMETTE TO TRAIN SOLDIERS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 10.—President Carl G. Doney of Willamette university here signed a contract today with the war department, obligating the university in train from 200 to 250 soldiers for warfare. The youths will be under the student army training corps and will receive \$30 per month, clothing, board, quarters and instruction without cost, as in other institutions where training is to be given.

University trustees have asked the war department whether barracks will be built here.

TURKEY THREATENS WAR WITH BULGARIA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The information reached here today from a source usually reliable that Turkey has sent a large force to the border of Bulgaria where trouble is brewing over division of territorial spoils of war between these two allies of Germany and Austria-Hungary.

FRANCE MAKES HER MARRIAGES EASIER

PARIS, Sept. 10.—Marriage steps have been simplified by a recent vote in the chamber. The future wife can now take care of all the legal formalities when her man is at the front. Two witnesses instead of four, and parental consent is no longer necessary between the ages of 21 and 30.

WELLEN FARMERS PLAN ORGANIZED WAR ON COYOTES

At the residence of Fred Luy on Friday this week the residents of the Wellen and Antelope districts will meet to organize an association whose purpose will be to exterminate coyotes so that they can raise more sheep, goats and turkeys. This movement is independent of the government's placing expert coyote hunters in the county this fall. The following petition is being circulated and liberally signed:

"We, the undersigned farmers and stock raisers, residing in the Wellen and Antelope district of Jackson county, realize the damage being done by coyotes to livestock in said districts and believe that steps should be taken to reduce the number of coyotes working in these districts and thereby reducing the damage and loss to livestock.

"We agree to assist in the organization of the farmers and stock raisers of these districts for the control and eradication of predatory animals by joining the Coyote club that will be organized for this purpose. And we further agree to support such work in accordance with the constitution and by-laws as may be adopted by this organization.

"We further agree, if possible, to meet at the residence of Fred Luy on Friday, September 13th, at 2 p. m. to assist in perfecting such organization.

"The boundaries of this district will be decided at the meeting to be held September 13th. We are also in favor of the government plan which provides for a competent hunter to devote his entire time in the assistance of his work.

FRENCH DEPUTY DEAD OF WOUNDS

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Sept. 10.—(Havas).—Gaston Dumesnil, member of the French chamber of deputies, died early today in a hospital near the front. Shortly before his death, Deputy Dumesnil was decorated with the cross of the Legion of Honor. Deputy Abel Ferry, who was wounded at the same time, was made a chevalier in the Legion of Honor by the premier. Deputy Dumesnil is the thirteenth deputy to be killed at the front.

CAGE WITH MINERS DROPS IN SHAFT

NANAIMO, B. C., Sept. 10.—Sixteen men were in a cage which dropped down a shaft of a coal mine near here when a cable broke early today. Reports from the mine said it was believed none escaped death. Details were lacking. The cage dropped 300 feet, it was reported.

MITCHELL MAKES FISH SCREENS FOR ALL STATE STREAMS

J. W. Mitchell has closed his blacksmith business, after having been engaged in it continuously for the past 37 years, and has just closed a contract with State Fish and Game Warden Shoemaker to construct and sell all the fish screens used throughout the state. He will retain his ladder manufacturing business on South Riverside, however, and will have his fish screen establishment on East Main street in the store room just vacated by the Waters paint store, into which he moved today.

There are about 4000 irrigation ditches to be screened throughout the state, and the orders for the screens, which Mr. Mitchell will make, will be taken by the deputy fish and game wardens in their respective districts. State Fish Screen Superintendent Jack Aitken is at present in eastern Oregon lining up the deputies in that section to take screen orders. The making of screens will begin at once, and Mr. Mitchell expects the business to increase rapidly and give employment to a number of men.
