MASTER TRAITORS OF HISTORY.

THE complete exposure by the United States government of the fact that Lenin, Trotzky and other chiefs of the Russian Bolsheviks are paid German agents acting under instructions of the German general staff and financed by the German Imperial bank and as such have not only betrayed the allies of Russia but the Russian people and especially the Russian workmen, confirms only what has long been suspected and stamps Lenin and Trotzky as the master traitors of history, the Judas Iscariots of Russia.

The evidence gathered by the Creel Committee is most complete and damning as to the Bolsheviks, who were sent into Russia by Germany and have followed instructions to the letter in aiding in its partition, in the destruction of the army, and in creating anarchy throughout Russia that the country would fall an easy victim to the Hun.

The evidence also proves conclusively that Germany, before the assassination of the archduke of Austria, had on June 9 ordered the immediate mobilization of all industrial enterprises in Germany preparatory to a declaration of war against France and Russia for which only an excuse was awaited and it also shows that in November, 1914, "destructive agents" were ordered sent abroad to the United States for the destruction of war supplies and materials. The first circular reads:

To Berlin: Kommandanten: Within 24 hours of the receipt of this circular you are to inform all industrial concerns by wire that the documents with industrial mobilization plans and with registration forms be opened, such as are referred to in the circular of the commission of Count von Waldersee and Caprivi of June 27, 1917.

The second order, showing now Germany was treating a friendly neutral nation, reads:

To Marinegenanturen and Flottenverwaltungen: You are ordered to mobilize immediately all destruction agents and observers in those commercial and military ports in Canada and America where munitions are being loaded on ships going to Russia, France and England. Where there are storehouses of such munitions, and where fighting units are stationed. It is necessary to lure thru third parties who stand in no relation to the official representatives of Germany, agents for arranging explosions on ships bound for enemy countries, and for arranging delays, embroilments and difficulties during the loading, dispatching and unloading of ships. For this purpose we are especially recommending to your attention leaders gangs, among whom there are many anarchists and escaped criminals, and that you get in touch with German and neutral shipping offices as a means of observing agents of enemy countries who are receiving and shipping the munitions.

The complete control of the Bolsheviks by the German general staff, is shown by the following order, dated in October, 1917:

To the Council of People's Commissaries: In accordance with the agreement which took place in Kronstadt in July of the present year between officials of our general staff and leaders of the Russian revolutionary army and democracy, Messrs. Lenin, Trotzky, Rasokolnikov and Dybenko, the Russian division of our general staff operating in Finland is ordering to Petrograd officers for the disposal of the information department of the staff.

The espionage department in accordance with the agreement with Messrs. Lenin, Trotzky and Sonoff will have the surveillance of the foreign embassies and military missions and of the counter revolutionary movement and will perform the espionage and counter-espionage work on the internal fronts, for which purpose agents will be assigned to the espionage cities.

But the Germans went further and actually dictated the candidates to be elected by the Russian council of Workmen and Soldiers as follows:

To the Commissar of Foreign Affairs: By the order of the local department of the German general staff, the Intelligence section has informed us of the names and the characteristics of the main candidates for the re-election of the central executive committee. The general staff orders us to insist on the election of the following people: Trotzky, Lenin, Zinoviev, Kamenoff, Joffe, Sverdlov, Lunacharski, Kollontai, Fabrikas, Martov, Steklov, Goldman, Franze, Lander, Milk, Preobrazhski, Sollova, Sidorov, Golberg, Avramov, Volodarski, Haskolnikov, Stuchka, Peters and Noubut. Please inform the president of the council of the general staff's wish.

The result of Lenin and Trotzky's betrayal of Russia is seen in the present reign of terror in Russia—only equalled in modern history by the reign of terror during the French revolution, which in number of victims it probably surpasses. Arnold Dorsch-Fleuret, correspondent of the New York World, who has escaped to Sweden since the decree issued for the murder of all Americans in Russia, cables as follows:

"Only here, back in civilization where murder is a crime, do we begin to comprehend how little the world can understand what Russia has come to in these last weeks.

"The Bolsheviks have instituted a reign of terror as the only means to maintain the dictatorship, killing without trial or before inquisitorial tribunals.

"The Bolsheviks have entirely lost popular support and are keeping themselves in power only by the bayonets they are still able to buy.

"The peasants are in revolt everywhere.

"In every city in Russia there are the same scenes of terror. Conditions are even worse in the provinces. Commissioners are sent from Moscow to organize the worst elements and take vengeance, loot, kill officers and perpetrate other outrages.

"The struggle has passed the stage of class war. Every man is at every other man's throat. The state of all Russia is beyond the comprehension of people accustomed to civilization."

The frenzied orgy of bloodshed shows that the betrayers of country, of people, of socialism and of democracy have reached the lowest level of political and social degradation and that the end of Bolshevism is not far off. The tyranny that strives to perpetuate itself by blood is doomed and deliverance is at hand. The Russian people have risen and aided by the allies will shortly overthrow the evil geni of the revolution, the anarchy bought and paid for by German gold, and restore a freed Russia to her place among the nations.

The fever of the revolution has about run its course. The pendulum has swung from the dark tyranny of the Czar to the blood terror of the Bolsheviks. Somewhere between the two a restored Russia will find herself and Slav genius emerge triumphant in a new democracy.

GREAT SHORTAGE IN CANNED GOODS

The United States food administration gives warning that there will be a great shortage of canned vegetables on the market this winter, and that several varieties of canned vegetables will be practically unobtainable.

"The government has reserved for army and navy uses practically the entire output of the commercial canneries in many lines," said Thomas Farrell chairman of the food administration's price interpretation committee, "and there will be only a limited amount and scant variety of canned vegetables on the market. Tomatoes, corn, peas and string beans will be especially short, and wise families will can or dry sufficient supplies of these for their needs by home methods. While it is now too late for the canning of peas, tomatoes and corn are still plentiful in Oregon, and some string beans are still available. The tomatoes can be canned at home, and the string beans and corn can be either canned or dried by simple methods. For drying string beans and corn should be blanched in hot water or steam for from five to ten minutes, then dried in the sunshine or in the oven until free from moisture and crisp. When used later in the winter they should be soaked in water before cooking, to restore the moisture content, and they will be found to be equal, if not superior, to the canned product."
